MAYHEM CHARGED

BIT FELLOW PRISONER

IN THE CALABOOSE.

Callahan, the Irishman Who Has Been
a Pest to the Police for Some Time.
Again Accused—May Be Indicted for
Penitentiary Offense—At Times Is
Wholly Irresponsible for His Deeds
—Now in Jail.

While in the city jail last night Cal-
lahan, the Irishman who has been a
pest to the police for the past month
or two, attempted to eat a fellow pris-
oner alive, and as a result he is now
being held for the circuit court and in
all probability he will be indicted for
attempted mayhem.

Callahan was recently given a 10-
days sentence for vagrancy after hav-
ing striven in vain to prove his in-
nocence of the charge in the police
court. Yesterday he was released
from jail but before nightfall had
gotten drunk again. During the early
evening he made himself a nuisance
on Main street and he was once more
run in by Marshal Gurdane.

With Callahan in the jail last night
was a young man who had been lock-
ed for being drunk. This morning he
told the officers that Callahan had
attacked him during the night and had
bit him on the neck and ear. The
boy's appearance indicated that he
had been chewed by the wild Irish-
man, and he was sent to tell his story
to the district attorney.

Callahan is being held in the city
jail awaiting the action of Mr. Phelps,
and should that officer prefer charges
against him he will be indicted for a
penitentiary offense.

Callahan has been the source of
much trouble since his arrival here
and what to do with him has been a
problem to the police. At times he
has seemed wholly irresponsible, and
the police declare that if he cannot
be sent to the penitentiary he should
be committed to the asylum.

very successful, from a numerical

and harmonious body of men who feel
benefitted by the meeting as the su-
perintendents became better acquaint-
ed with each other and a better un-
derstanding was secured of much of
the administrative work that devolves
on them.

It was recommended that salaries
of county superintendents be fixed at
such an amount as shall be equivalent
to the average salaries paid to the
other county officers of their counties
who give their whole time to the duties
of their office.

It was suggested that counties
might unite for institute purposes and
use the institute fund to defray ex-
penses of the joint meeting.

They went on record as favoring one
board of control for all the normal
schools.

Superintendent L. R. Alderman, of
Yamhill county, was elected president
and Superintendent J. T. Neff, of Was-
co, was elected secretary for the en-
suing year.

"GOING AFTER" ROOSEVELT.

The President Must Come to Oregon
on a Hunt, Says McMurray.

Nothing less than a hunting trip
by President Theodore Roosevelt to
Oregon will satisfy the passenger of-
ficials of the Harriman lines in this
state. Oregon is proclaimed as the
best hunting ground in the United
States, and measures are being taken
to prove this fact to the world, says
the Oregon Daily Journal.

General Passenger Agent William
McMurray, who leaves tonight for
Chicago to attend a meeting of the
Western Passenger association, has
determined to give special attention
for the next year to exploiting Ore-
gon's game, fish and scenery as well
as its commercial resources. The last
thing he did before departing was to
send out to all agents of the company
in the state a circular directing them
to secure all possible photographs of
hunting and fishing scenes.

Personal efforts on the part of a
few of the railroad officials have al-
ready yielded fruits along this line,
and some good game pictures are
coming in. Some of them show in
striking degree the abundance of deer
and fish. There are also some splen-
did specimens of the cougar and bear.
It is especially desired that photogra-
phs of bear be sent in.

Mr. McMurray asks that hunters
take the trouble to secure photogra-
phs of the game taken by them. Country
photographers are asked to furnish pic-
tures at usual prices.

It is believed since the hunting trip
of Jim Jeffries and his associates,
who have hunted big game in many
places, that Oregon has not been half
advertized as a game country. Jeff-
ries was immensely surprised and
pleased, it is said, with the great
abundance of fine game found in the
Cascade range in Lane county and has
declared that Oregon is the only hunt-
ing ground for him hereafter.

ROY BELTS HAS TYPHOID FEVER.

Was Brought to St. Anthony Hospital
Yesterday.

Roy Belts, son of Douglas Belts of
Pilot Rock, was brought to St. An-

RETURNED FROM HOOD RIVER.

Fruit Exhibit at Irrigation Con-
vention Was Splendid.

Representative C. A. Barrett was
here this morning upon his way home
to Athens from attending the Irriga-
tion congress and fair at Hood River.
Regarding the same he said:

"The convention was reasonably
well attended, and though some par-
ties who were on the program did not
appear, the session was productive of
good."

"The fruit fair that is being held
at Hood River is a revelation. Most
of the fruit displayed consists of ap-
ples, peaches and pears. With their
apples the Hood River people have
surprised the world this season. For
their best varieties they have been
getting from \$2.25 to \$3.10 per box
and all of the fruit has been contract-
ed for in New York. As a result of
these prices the apple growers have
been making small fortunes this sea-
son."

"Much of the success of the Hood
River fair is due to the care that is
taken of the orchards. There are no
wormy apples to be seen, and the
fruit on the trees looks like it had
been polished."
