Holding Over Many Sheep.

A. Smythe and son, Gus, have 4000 ewes and 4000 lambs on the range in Gilliam and Kiekkitt counties, and 3000 head of meat sheep, which they are feeding on the home ranch in Kiekkitt county. Smythe & Smythe (which is Smythe and son, Dan) have 2000 breeding ewes and 2000 lambs on the range in Gilliam county, and 3000 lambs on feed at Sunnyside, Wash. Also A. Smythe and William Smith have 5000 lambs on feed at Sunnyside. A. Smythe claims that he has the best lot of lambs in eastern Oregon or eastern Washington. These are all half blood Lincolnshire. These men are intelligent sheep raisers, having been in the business for many years. They take no chances and don't trust to luck. They now have 1000 tons of hay secured and have their sheep where they are well protected from the winter storms.—Arlington Record.

Freak at Horse Fair.

J. E. Carter, who conducts a livery stable at Eleventh and Front streets, has a freak on exhibition at the fair grounds. He has a horse with a snake in its eye. The snake is apparently about six inches long, and is constantly on the move. He purchased the horse in Canyon county about a month ago and has driven it in Boise, where it has attracted much attention. He is exhibiting the animal on the fair grounds and intends to take it to Seattle and other central cities, for exhibition purposes after the fair is over. Probably 500 people paid an admission of 10 cents yesterday to see the strange freak of nature.

Many theories have been advanced by veterinarians, but none which seem to explain the freak.—Boise Statesman.

Elm Roots Clog Sewer.

The discovery was made yesterday that the roots of the cork-bark elm trees on the Normal campus had penetrated the sewer main from the main building and clogged about 100 feet of pipe with a fine meshwork of rapidly growing rootlets.

It has been found necessary to clean and relay the pipe and it may be even necessary to set the line in cement to prevent a recurrence of the stoppage. The sewer has been laid five years and is 11 feet below the surface.

Doubtless this is but the forerunner of many similar cases which may occur in parts of the city where shade trees are full grown.—Lewiston Teller.
