Among the Exchanges of the Inland Empire

Bryan Defeats Judge Smith.

It has been definitely settled that Edward L. Bryan of Payette has been elected judge of the seventh district, defeating Judge Frank Smith by about 50 votes.

The vote of "Mineral, Washington county, was reported yesterday. It gave Bryan 26 and Smith 10, a majority of 26. Verification and correction of the error in tabulation reported Friday makes Bryan's majority in Washington county 256, with one small precinct to hear from. The vote is a tie in Owyhee, with two small precincts unreported, while Smith's majority in Canyon county is 206. Consequently Bryan has a lead of 50 votes which is not likely to be reduced, but rather increased.

Mr. Bryan, the successful candidate, was born in Oregon. His parents crossed the plains in 1843, and stopped a short time here. Their son, Edward, was the first white child born west of the coast range. Mr. Bryan is comparatively a new resident of Idaho. He is a man of fine appearance and good address; he is well grounded in the law and enjoys the confidence of those who have become acquainted with him.—Boise Statesman.

Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone will be tried before Judge Bryan. They would have been tried before Judge Smith had he been re-elected.

Leonard Gets \$5000 Damages. A jury in Judge Cleland's court for Multnomah county Tuesday awarded Frank J. Leonard \$5000 damages in his suit against the Portland Reduction and Mining company on account of personal injuries received by plaintiff August 26, 1905, while in the employ of the defendant at the Monumental mine near this place.

It was claimed by Leonard that he got caught between a drainage pipe, projecting across the collar of the shaft, and the bucket in which he was being hoisted, and attributed the accident to carelessness on the part of the company. He claimed to be badly injured about the head, face and body and sued for \$10,000, getting a verdict as above.

L. R. Webster and John F. Logan were attorneys for the plaintiff, while J. F. Booth represented the defense. Dr. E. D. Steincamp, E. S. Smith and Mike Blake attended the trial from this place as witnesses.—Granite Gem.

Many Railroaders Have Typhoid.

Albert Hastad was visiting in the city yesterday from Culeaca. Mr. Hastad has just been discharged from the railroad hospital at that place after a siege of typhoid fever. He states that there is a large number of cases of typhoid in that locality. Many laborers from the railroad camps have contracted the disease and the typhoid ward at the hospital, which

is equipped for receiving 11 patients, has been filled for the past several weeks. As fast as patients are discharged new ones are brought in. There are quite a number of other patients in the hospital suffering from injuries of various kinds due to accidents along the line.—Lewiston Tribune.

More About 'The Lucky Widow.'

Mrs. Jane Coonen, discoverer of the gold mine "Lucky Widow," who formerly lived on the south fork of the Cowlitz creek, but is now living in a tent on Nob Hill and sending her children to school, celebrated her 45th birthday yesterday. She was the recipient of many presents from her neighbors, including shoes, clothes, eatables and other things. Mrs. Coonen was extremely grateful for the remembrances of her friends.

Mrs. Coonen is a widow with four children to raise and educate. She is a remarkable woman. One night while on her homestead up the Cowlitz she dreamed of an undiscovered gold mine in the mountains, and setting out the next day with her four children and a few rations determined to locate the mine. After a memorable trip, she and her children returned barefooted and hungry. The mine was discovered, however, and the ore is pronounced by mining experts to be above the average.—Yakima Republic.
