NO COAL IN SIGHT.

Local Fuel Situation No Better Than It Was Two Weeks Ago.

The coal situation in Pendleton has not been relieved any this week, although the dealers are daily expecting to receive shipments. Practically no coal is to be had at all, and people are forced to use wood and slawwood.

The plan to have British Columbia coal shipped here does not seem to meet with enthusiasm with consumers, as the price will be beyond the means of many. It is understood that the freight charges on coal from Alberta will be considerably higher than obtain for shipments from other districts, and of course the price of coal would be necessarily greater.

The O. R. & N. seems to be putting forth efforts to relieve the situation, but so far no announcement has been made that coal will be shipped to this point in the immediate future.

INTO COURT UNDER GUARD.

New Yorkers Threaten to Lynch Accused Murderer.

Herkimer, N. Y., Nov. 21.—Chester Gillette was taken into court under a heavy guard this morning, the sheriff having heard that an attempt would be made to lynch. The reading of Grace Brown's plaintive letters yesterday has incensed the people against the accused murderer.

Great Britain's Rainfall.

Over England and Wales the average yearly rainfall is about thirty-four inches, in Scotland it reaches forty-six inches and in Ireland about thirty-eight inches. Possibly the wettest parts of Britain are in Cumberland, where the rainfall may attain 150 inches per year. One inch of rain on one acre of ground means a hundred tons of water.—London Graphic.
