RANGE IS ALLOTTED

MEETING FOR WESTERN DIVISION OF BIG RESERVE.

Stockmen and Forest Officials at Canyon City—Allotments in the Western Division Are Adjusted—In That Portion of Blue Mountain Reserve 240,000 Sheep and 28,000 Horses and Cattle Will Be Grazed Next Year.

Umatilla county stockmen range exclusively in the eastern division of the Blue mountains forest reserve and their range meeting was held at Sampter on November 8, at which time the question of range allotment was adjusted for next year.

The preliminary steps in the allotment of granting areas in the western division of the Blue mountain forest reserve have been taken by stockmen and departmental officials.

The representative of the government in attendance at the meetings of stockmen were as follows: A. F. Potter, chief of the range and grazing service, of Washington, D. C.; M. I. Ericson, assistant forest inspector, Washington, D. C.; D. B. Sheller, superintendent and acting supervisor of the western division, Washington, D. C.; A. S. Ireland, forest supervisor of the western division, Prineville; Henry Ireland, deputy forest ranger, Prineville; Arthur Bennett, forest guard, Prineville; and Monte Pearson, forest guard, Prineville.

Mr. Potter was introduced to the stockmen's association and gave an address replete with information and recommendation. He incidentally complimented the stockgrowers on their new association and said that governmental officers would far rather transact business through representatives of such bodies than with the individual direct.

As an indication of the future course of the government in allotting grazing privileges to stockmen, he said that many difficulties were in the way of satisfactory adjustment and of the two claims for privilege, residence and steady use, the former would grow stronger and the latter of less importance as the system became better established.

The western division had been divided into 10 grazing districts, and representatives of both the cattle and sheep industry were appointed or selected committees to adjust the lines within each district.

During next grazing season there will be permitted 240,000 head of sheep, not counting lambs, and 28,000 head of cattle and horses. Last season there were 275,000 sheep and 22,000 head of cattle and horses furnished range.

The fee for horses from June 1 to October 21 is 20 cents per head; for cattle, for the same period, 20 cents per head; for sheep from July 1 to October 21, 10 cents per head.

Forest officials say that all allotted and reserve areas will be properly protected next season, and that sufficient rangers will be on duty to insure proper administration of the law.

GENERAL NEWS.

A B. & O. express ran into an open switch near Pittsburg, Pa., killing Harry Shepard, Charles Denny, S. F. Strike and J. J. McCuskey. Several were injured.

Operator Mattoax, upon whose shoulders is placed the responsibility for the wreck near Lynchburg, Va., Thanksgiving Day, is still missing, although detectives of the Southern railway are bending every effort to locate him.

G. O. Yergy of the Yergy Lumber company of Helena, and a well known Helena man, while driving across the street car tracks at the intersection of Benton and Lyndale avenues at 6 o'clock last evening, was struck by an electric car and almost instantly killed.

Henry S. Hartley, senior member of the grain brokerage firm of H. S. Hartley & Co., of Kansas City, pleaded guilty in the district court to receiving rebates from the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad. Judge Boland assessed the minimum penalty, a fine of \$1000.

The entire estate left by Carl Schurtz, according to the report filed by the appraiser in the surrogate's office, for the purpose of adjusting the inheritance tax shows a net value of \$255,150. The property consists largely of railroad bonds. Mr. Schurtz left no real estate.

An express car on the Cotton Belt route, was robbed near Redwater, Texas. The express manager was thrown off after being badly beaten, and was seriously injured. The robbery was a complete success, though the company refuses to tell how much was taken. The robbers escaped.

At La Grande, Mo., J. E. Rohon and Hosea Duvall, constables, levied upon some trunks belonging to a theatrical company and a fight resulted. Rohon and Duvall were shot and killed, and Orlo K. Stuart, an actor, was fatally wounded, and Roy Millard, an actor, may die of his wounds.

The Chicago Tribune states that during the present season 74 men have been killed and 70 wounded in all parts of the United States, so far as recorded, by being mistaken for game in the deer districts, or by the purely accidental shooting of hunters not directly aimed at. Some of the wounded are expected to die.

NORTHWEST NEWS. The county board of Yakima estimates that the recent floods did \$50,000 damage to roads and bridges done in that county. Jack Arthur stabbed George Kennebec, probably fatally, at Shoshone, Idaho, during a fight over a gambling debt. Arthur is in jail. J. M. Brown, county horticultural inspector at Yakima, estimates the value of this year's fruit crop in that county at \$1,200,000. Fourteen hundred carloads will be shipped out. Brakeman Hale was caught between a car and some timbers at the coal loaders at La Grande, and seriously hurt. His collar bone and three ribs were broken and a foot badly mashed. Forty acres will be added to the Canyon City townsite by pre-emption, application having been made to the land office. Proof will be made January 15. No bids were made on the Rumping Lake dam (a part of the Yakima reclamation project) and it is probable the government will build it first hand. It will cost approximately \$140,000. H. Proctor has been postmaster at Elgin for 14 years, during which time he has been away from his office just one entire day, and that was Thanksgiving day last week, when he visited his son at La Grande. Two masked men held up Anton Knutson's grocery at 1169 Belmont street, Portland, compelling the proprietor, two clerks and two visitors to hold up their hands. The robbers secured \$170, two watches and escaped. Senator Fulton has promised to introduce the first day congress meets a bill providing for the construction of a \$2,000,000 postoffice at Portland; also bills for public buildings at Albany, Oregon City, La Grande and Pendleton, to cost \$100,000 each. Word has reached Ione of the suicide at Newtown, Mo., of Jesse Brackett. Brackett formerly lived at Ione. Drinking and financial reverses are said to be responsible.
