FIGHTING THE SCAB

OVER 17,000,000 SHEEP DIPPED IN PAST YEAR.

Percentage of Cures Has Reached 99.35 Per Cent Where Strict Record Was Kept—Federal Inspectors in Pendleton Are Part of an Immense Government Bureau—Work of the Bureau is Reducing Stock Diseases.

Few people who have not investigated the subject have little idea of the immense extent of the operations of the bureau of animal industry or federal stock inspection, which is represented in Pendleton by Drs. Lytle and Pinkerton, federal stock inspectors.

The year book of the department of agriculture, which has just been issued gives some interesting statistics of the work of this important bureau, and while the reports of the federal inspectors located in this city are but infinitesimal drops in the great department, yet the aggregate of the service performed by this department is remarkable.

By the report of the department it is shown that 17,000,000 sheep have been dipped for scab by the department in the past year. This is the greatest number ever handled by the department and has increased from 672,944 in 1899, by rapid strides to the enormous total of the past year.

The number of cattle inspected for mange by the department in the past year was over 14,000,000 and the number of dipplings of cattle reached 563,394 head. The number of horses inspected for mange was 15,971. The department cleaned and disinfected 29,897 stock cars in making them ready for interstate shipments.

The report of the secretary of agriculture says that the work of the bureau of animal industry has succeeded in ridding several badly infected states of sheep scab and has reduced the percentage of scab perceptibly in every state in which that disease is found. The percentage of cures through the dipplings of 6,000,000 head of sheep of which strict records were kept, was 99.35 per cent.

Total Value of Walla Walla County Property is \$21,030,213.

County Auditor Honeycutt and his force of deputies yesterday evening completed the work of extending the 1906 tax rolls and turned the books over to Treasurer Hawley, says the Walla Walla Statesman.

Owing to the greatly increased valuations this year last and the many changes made by the county board of equalization the work of extending the rolls this year has been extremely arduous.

A summary of the equalized values shows that the total real and personal property in the county amounts to \$21,030,213. The real estate values amount to \$17,343,548 and personal property \$3,684,665.

TAX MEETING DECEMBER 22

SCHOOL TAX LEVY NEEDED ABOUT SAME AS LAST YEAR.

Board Has Not Yet Decided Upon How Much of a Levy to Ask the Voters for at the Annual Meeting—J. W. Maloney Has Been Appointed to Succeed T. G. Halley on the City School Board—The Latter Will Take Up His Residence Soon in Portland.

J. W. Maloney, cashier of the Pendleton Savings bank, has been appointed as a member of the local school board to take the place made vacant by the resignation of Judge T. G. Halley. The appointment was made by Chairman Lee Teutsch at a meeting of the board last evening, and the selection was immediately confirmed by the remainder of the board.

The resignation of Mr. Halley as a member of the board has been on file for some time, but its acceptance was withheld until a successor could be decided upon. It is presumed Judge Halley severed his connection because he is intending to take up the practice of law in Portland when his term upon the supreme bench expires.

"In selecting a man for the vacancy I was influenced to choose Mr. Maloney," said Lee Teutsch last evening, "by the fact that he is interested in the welfare of the schools through having boys attending the same, and is also loyal to the public school system. He believes that our high school course should be sufficient to furnish a proper education for most pupils."

Mr. Maloney has accepted the honor conferred upon him and hereafter will serve with the board in the management of the city's schools.

Tax Meeting December 22.

At the meeting of the board last evening the proposition of revenue for the coming year was also discussed and a report from Clerk Bleckers upon the financial condition of the schools was read. According to Chairman Teutsch it was not decided definitely what levy to ask for, but he believes the tax needed will be about the same as that voted last year.

Mohair Goats in New Mexico.

Hillsboro, N. M., Dec. 5.—Mrs. M. Armor of this city, who is the most extensive breeder of goats in the United States, and who owns an Angora ram worth \$5000 today gave her views on the goat raising subject. She states that of the million pounds of mohair annually produced in this country New Mexico supplies half, one corporation alone owning ranches grazing between 9000 and 10,000 Angoras. The industry, she says, is growing amazingly and, as the Angora requires little attention during all but the breeding season, they could be successfully bred in all states.

Salton Sea Claims.

San Francisco, Dec. 5.—A large number of farmers in the Imperial valley, whose meadows were flooded by the Colorado river as it swept on its course towards the now defunct Salton sea, have taken action against the Mexican government and claims to the extent of \$350,000 have been lodged. The claims, which are being considered today by the United States consul at Mexico, are based on the alleged carelessness of the Mexican government in not making due inspection of the Colorado river on Mexican soil.

Capital is Necessary in Mexico.

Vera Cruz, Mexico, Dec. 5.—The American consul here has forwarded to Washington a report on American immigration into this country, in which he states that Mexico is not a paradise for men without knowledge or money. The republic is already thronged with people from the United States, many of them arriving with just enough money to pay their expenses one way. They have no idea of the customs of the people or of their language, consequently they become greatly disappointed and in many cases have to tramp back to the United States.

GENERAL NEWS.

The lowest temperature of this season at Portland was recorded early the morning of December 4, when the mercury fell to 29 degrees above zero.

Prof. A. C. Strange, principal of the Crook county high school at Prineville, succeeds Prof. J. S. Landers as superintendent of The Dalles schools.

Pittsburg, Pa., has a scandal, several members of the city council being accused of being bribed to vote for a franchise for the Pittsburg & Tube City railroad.

At Eureka, Cal., Thad O'Rourke, the brakeman on the Oregon & Eureka railroad, was murdered for his month's pay and thrown into the bay. No clue to the murderers.

The general offices of the Rock Island railroad system will be moved from Topeka to Chicago. D. E. Cain will be succeeded as general manager by F. O. Melcher, now assistant general manager at Chicago.

The Manitoba cabinet at a special session recently decided to at once take in hand the government prosecution of all combinations of grain dealers and elevators, which in effect bear the grain markets against the farmers.

Mrs. Michael Dooney, of 511 Albina avenue, Portland, gave birth to a boy baby weighing 15 1/2 pounds, while she herself weighs but 106 pounds. The child is now nearly a week old, is healthy and the mother is doing well.

Anton Fritz of Portland, deliberately threw himself in front of a running train at San Fernando, Cal., and was instantly killed. It has been proven that he had sunk his last dollar in a mining speculation just before suiciding.

Bishop Walker, of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of western New York, has formally deposed the Rev. Algernon S. Crapsey from the ministry of the Episcopal church, in accordance with the verdict of the ministers of that diocese. His offense consisted in denying the doctrine of the immaculate conception.

The assessment on the Southern Pacific main line trackage in Lane county, amounting to over 40 miles, remains the same as the assessor fixed it, \$17,000 per mile, the company asking for a reduction to \$10,000 per mile, but the rolling stock assessment was reduced from \$2000 to \$1000 per mile, leaving the total assessment on the main line \$18,000 per mile.
