New Wood Vulcanizing Process Jacksonville, Fla., Dec. 5.—It is claimed that the new process of vulcanizing wood materially prolongs its life and that its tensile strength is increased by more than 25 per cent, while the weight is reduced by about one-fifth. It is also claimed that the weight resisting power is increased from 30 to 40 per cent and as the process does away with all kilns and the necessity of maintaining large plants it will revolutionize the southern lumber industry.
