

### CHILD LABOR ISSUE

URGED TO THE FRONT BY NATIONAL ASSOCIATION

Recognized as a Great and Growing Evil by Societies Which Have Sent Over Four Thousand Delegates to Cincinnati-There Are Now 2,000. 000 Children Employed in the Manufactories of the United States, and the Number is Constantly Increas-

Cincinnati, Dec. 13.-The annual onvention of the National Child La1 bor association, which commenced here today, was a notable one. When Dr. A. H. Frieberg called the meeting to order in the convention hall of the Hotel Havlin there were over 4000 persons present. Every state in the union sent delegates. Governor Har-ris of Ohio, and Major Dempsey of this city in brief addresses welcomed the delegates. Dr. Felix Adler, chairman of the National Child Labor committee, said the suppression o child labor was the most important the country has to deal with. the speakers were Gov. J. W.
