Wilkinson Fell Dead. Calling at St. Elizabeth's hospital for the purpose of saying good bye to a sick friend before he left Baker on a long journey, Edward Wilkinson, for 20 years prominent in Sparta and Pine Valley, dropped dead inside the hospital door this morning.

Mr. Wilkinson was planning to go to San Francisco to spend the winter and was making arrangements to leave Baker tomorrow. He called at the hospital to say good bye to a friend and just as he entered the door, before he had even an opportunity to explain his presence to the sisters, fell dead.

Edward Wilkinson was one of the substantial men of Baker county. He was 65 years of age, was born in England and came to this country 30 years ago, coming to Sparta, where he made considerable money in placer mining. Later, he in company with his brother, Lewis Wilkinson, established a store at Pine Town which prospered. About four years ago the brother died, and Mr. Wilkinson sold out his interests in the store and placed his money out living a retired life. He was never married.—Baker City Herald.

Money Gone as Well as Marois.

The only development today in the mysterious disappearance of Louis Marois, the Klondiker, who dropped out of sight last Tuesday, was the discovery that he had no money on deposit in North Yakima banks, whereas, it was supposed he had a large sum in these institutions.

A chest containing his valuable millwright tools is at the Northern Pacific freight depot.

It is thought his having no money in the banks lends color to stories that he met with no accident, but has left the country. He was engaged to marry Ambrosia Adams, a school teacher at Wenas.

Under the direction of Sheriff Grant parties today searched the Yakima river for a long distance below the Naches ford and also the country between Wenas and the ford.—Spokesman-Review (Yakima Corres.)

The Latest About "Count" Rossi. "Count" Rossi, whose memory is still fresh in the minds of residents of this city and Spokane because of his ability to negotiate loans upon his representation that he was soon to come into possession of a vast Italian estate, is said to be confined in an Italian prison. From the same source it was learned the Italian is incarcerated under an assumed name, and that he is trying to create the impression that he is an American citizen.

The predicament of Count Rossi came to light by his writing to marital relatives here, asking for \$50. Mrs. Polly, a relative of Rossi's wife, formerly living near Craig mountain, on receipt of the letter came to Lewiston and borrowed the \$50 from a friend, giving a note for it. She cabled the money to the count. Rossi did not get the money, through some mistake in the address.—Lewiston Tribune.

Controlling Smallpox at Caldwell.

The people of Caldwell have reason to rejoice that the smallpox situation is not assuming proportions. So far the disease has been confined to two families. The fact that these two families have been swept by the contagion, nearly every member of each having had it, without it spreading to others, reflects great credit upon the quarantine measures of the county health officer. Caldwell has had the advantage of Nampa and Emmett in that she had warning of the approach of the enemy, and contrary to precedent, she has profited by the experience of her sister cities and taken adequate precautionary measures. The schools have been uninterrupted, and it is hoped that every one will observe proper preventatives so that an epidemic may be avoided.—Boise Capital News.

He was sitting in the buggy dead, his body so cold and rigid that he must have died a long time before he was discovered. Death is supposed to have resulted from heart failure.
