Investing in Oregon Timber.
A tract of fir timber, consisting of about 300,000,000 feet, in Lane county, has been sold by J. D. Lacey & Co. to Kent & Moberly. The price paid was in the neighborhood of \$200,000. The purchasers are large operators in yellow pine in Louisiana. J. D. Lacey & Co. selected the timber from various owners of small tracts, and cruised it, and on this cruise the purchase was made. The southerners acquired it as an investment, believing in the theory that Oregon timber values are bound to advance in the next five or 10 years. In the last two months Lacey & Co. have invested for eastern and southern clients \$1,500,000 in Oregon and Columbia river timber.
