Among the Exchanges of the Inland Empire

Grading Between Palouse and Moscow. The first grading camp on the line of the Spokane & Inland railway between the Palouse and Moscow has been established, and a core of men commenced work this morning building shanties and barns.

John L. Taylor, a member of the right of way committee, returned from the vicinity of Viola yesterday. "There will be a force of at least 80 men working on the grade between this city and Viola within a short time; in fact as soon as proper accommodations can be prepared," said Mr. Taylor this morning. "It is the expectations of the company to complete the heavy grading by spring, providing the weather will allow the men to work the greater part of the time. The sounding of the ground between Palouse and Moscow has been completed and I am informed that they found but little rock, therefore the work will not require the length of time at first expected.—Moscow Mirror.

Hard Journey for an Old Man. J. D. Peters, 78 years of age, who was known in Boise as a stove repair man, left for Cornville, Ariz., last June with a covered wagon, driving a feeble old horse. The distance by the route traveled is over 1500 miles. Few young men would attempt such a trip. Doc Leonard met Peters at White Rocks, Nev., last fall and told him he could never drive through. Yesterday he received a letter from Peters which stated that he had arrived safe and sound at his destination. He left Boise with \$1.50 and beside earning his way he made \$23 on the trip. He had numerous breakdowns on his trip over the rough mountain roads, but always had wire to fix things up so he could plod along. Some men at 78 think they are old and helpless, yet Mr. Peters overcomes obstacles that a young man would not tackle and is cheerful about it. There are few like him.—Boise Capital News.

Believe Marois Skipped. After spending three days in quiet investigation Sheriff Grant this morning gave out for publication his first statement in regard to the mystery which surrounds the disappearance of Lew Marois, the alleged wealthy Klondiker who was engaged to be married soon to Miss Ambrosia Adams, a young school teacher of this city. The statement of Sheriff Grant covers the minutest details and at least sounds plausible. His theory is probably correct. The sheriff's story follows: "While I hate to say the words," began the sheriff, "there is no further reason why I should suppress the result of my investigations in this mys-

tery, and while I don't profess to be a Sherlock Holmes, either, I would stake my life that N. Lewis Marois was never drowned, nor killed by highwaymen, nor thrown from his horse and dragged to death. Neither has he committed suicide. He has simply deserted his sweetheart. He bends, instantly killed Martin Carlson, leave the impression that one of the theories advanced to account for his disappearance would be accepted by the community, and by the family which he has wronged.—Yakima Republic.

Recovered Stolen Horses. Sheriff Alex McNeill has just received word that Deputy Fial Jack, who left here Saturday morning, has recovered at Pendleton, Ore., two horses and saddles stolen from Horse Heaven last Saturday night. The horses were taken from the pasture of Gilbert Stinson, who lives two miles east of the county well, and the saddles from the barn of James Lowry, on the old Kelso ranch. The stock had been sold at Pendleton and the deputy had not captured thieves. The sheriff wired to Deputy Jack to keep after the parties if on their trail, the officers being convinced that they know who the thieves are. The sheriff's office was not notified of the theft until Friday night, starting out Deputy Jack and Cary early Saturday morning.—Prosper Bulletin.
