TO DIVIDE GRANT

LONG CREEK PEOPLE WANT A NEW COUNTY.

County Division Organization Started and an Active Campaign Opened—Bill for Division to Be Presented to the Coming Session of the Legislature—Charles Conger President of New Organization, and T. F. Hall Secretary.

An active movement to divide Grant county has been started at Long Creek where a public meeting was held last Saturday and a county division organization launched. The Long Creek Ranger says of the movement:

There was an enthusiastic county division meeting held in Long Creek Saturday, and what is likely to prove an initiative movement was started. Owing to the short time in which the notice of the meeting was given it was impossible for many of the Hamilton and Monument people to attend and this short notice was given, not to leave any one out, but because it was felt something should be done without delay.

An organization was perfected. William E. Weir was made chairman of the meeting, and T. F. Hall secretary. A discussion of the question was the order of the program for about a half hour. The town hall was well filled with citizens of all the northern part of Grant. Enthusiastic speeches were made by T. F. Hall, J. E. Jackson, William Chapman, Frank Kahler and Charles A. Coe. It developed in the course of the meeting that no one was there who was not in favor of county division and at frequent intervals during the discussion there was applause and stamping of the feet.

Charles Conger was elected president of the county division association and T. F. Hall was made secretary-treasurer.

Within the next two weeks it is probable meetings will be held all over this side of the county. Word has been received of a meeting to be held at Monument on Saturday, December 22.

To Become Part of Baker.
The Baker City Herald says of another movement to add the Greenhorn mining district to Baker county:

The Greenhorn mining district will be a part of Baker county, if a movement put on foot by the owners of the mining properties, and by the men of that district is a success.

John Thomsen, manager of the Red Boy mine, and the Olive Lake power plant, is in Baker today putting the project on its feet. Mr. Thomsen declares unless some opposition is met from the people of Baker City, that beyond question the next year will see that valuable mining district a part of Baker county.

The movement is fathered by him and has for its support the united efforts of the mine owners and the miners of the district. Mr. Thomsen says that Grant county will be willing to get rid of the Greenhorn country, and so far he has met no objection in Baker county to the plan.

The advantage of the plan lies in the fact that the mining interests all center in Baker county and not in Grant. The mining men and miners all transact business with Baker and oppose going over to Canyon City for county affairs. They prefer looking after such business while they are in Baker.

Imports of St. Thomas Large.

Washington, Dec. 18.—United States Consul Payne reports that the imports into St. Thomas, Danish West Indies, for the fiscal year, amounted to \$338,967. Of these the United States fur-nished \$407,561 worth; Germany, \$61,319; United Kingdom, \$166,645; France, \$20,176; British West Indies, \$58,639; and Denmark, \$29,464. The leading articles from the United States were breadstuffs, valued at \$73,619; provisions, \$15,444; manufactures of iron and steel, \$8151; boots and shoes, \$16,739; manufactures of wood, \$22,717; cotton and other fabrics, \$10,573, and coal, \$201,308.

The Tomb of Cicero.

London, Dec. 18.—At the monthly meeting of the Royal Archaeological association of the British museum to-night, the Duke of Argyle announced that recent excavations near Naples had been highly successful as the tomb of Cicero, who was assassinated 20 centuries ago, had been discovered. The tomb of the great orator is being carefully unearthed. It stands on a hill dominating both the Applan and Herculaneum ways.

Big Seizure of Game.

Oklahoma City, Dec. 18.—Large quantities of quail consigned to Chi-cago markets are being captured here daily. A few days ago a whole carload was captured by a marshal in north-ern Oklahoma, where most of the birds are being killed. The destruction of quail, after the season has closed, is very great and the appointment of an additional staff of game inspectors has become necessary.

OREGON'S METROPOLIS.
Population of Portland Estimated at 185,195.
The city of Portland, Ore., is lo-cated on both sides of the Willamette river, 12 miles from its confluence with the Columbia, and extends across the peninsula formed by these two rivers, almost to the latter. In the very near future the city limits will of necessity be extended to it.
Oregon City is located at the falls of the Willamette, 15 miles to the south, and is connected by steam and electric lines and boats. The space intervening is being rapidly filled by suburban homes, and in a few years one solid city will extend from the Willamette falls to the Columbia river.
The population in 1870 was 8,292. The population in 1880 was 17,577. The population in 1890 was 46,376. The population in 1900 was 90,425. In 1906, according to the city di-rectory census, it is 185,195, and it is growing more rapidly now than ever before. In 1910 it is safe to place the population at 250,000.

Portland Wheat Shipments.
The flags of 11 nations—England, France, Russia, Germany, Italy, Nor-way, the United States, Holland, Aus-tria, Chili, Denmark—fly on the grain fleet in North Pacific harbors, and Oregon exported 930,131 barrels of flour and over 12,000,000 bushels of wheat; while Washington sent out 1,295,019 barrels of flour and nearly 10,000,000 bushels of wheat. Port-land ships more wheat than any other one port in the United States, its ship-ments lacking but a few bushels of being one-fourth of the entire national export.
