Among the Exchanges of the Inland Empire

Both Legs Broken. While preparing to wash a window in the office of Paris & Kest on the second floor of the Sanna building about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, Charles Letts fell to the sidewalk, about 20 feet below on Ninth street. Both legs were broken and he was bruised about the head. Both fractures were near the ankles and the bone of one leg was protruding through the flesh when Letts was picked up. He was taken into the Eastman-Teller hardware store and later to St. Luke's hospital. The attending physician says the accident will not result fatally. Letts had just finished washing the windows in the front part of the office and was getting into position on the ledge below one of the rear windows to wash it when he lost his balance and with a loud shriek, fell to the ledge. The fracture of the bones in both legs indicates that he struck the hard cement walk on his feet.—Boise Statesman.

Fuel Coming Into Yakima. Of the 15 cars of coal that arrived yesterday scarcely any remains in the hands of the dealers. As soon as the announcement was made of the arrival of the coal the Northwestern Improvement company had a big run on the supply, and this morning the coal had vanished like the snow before a chinook wind.

Rushing Cars to Mines. General Superintendent Buckingham of the Short Line issued orders through the local train dispatcher's office Monday morning to have every available empty car rushed to the mines, in order to aid in bringing relief to the serious shortage of coal which exists not only in this section of the country, but all over the northwest. The orders said to take every car except those assigned for livestock and perishable goods, and run them through giving the trains preference over all time freight.

Safe Blowing at Tekoa. Last night the safe in the jewelry store of Troyer & Engle was blown up and the contents carried away by burglars, who gained an entrance to the store by breaking a pane of glass in a door in the rear. The knob on the safe was hammered off with a sledge, which had been secured from the blacksmith shop of G. A. Prellwitz, together with some other tools. A quantity of nitroglycerine was poured in, which ran down to the lower left-hand corner of the door, where it was discharged; this

shot tore the outer and heavier door from the safe when the inner door was beaten down with the sledge.

Mr. Troyer this morning stated that his stock was heavier than usual and that \$2500 would be a low estimate on the jewelry missing. The safe is ruined. Among the articles stolen were watches, rings, diamonds and silverware. Only \$14 in cash was obtained.

A reward of \$500 has been offered by the citizens of Tekoa for the capture of the burglars.—Spokesman-Review (Tekoa Corres.)

Yakima Valley Hay Market. Alfalfa is not advancing in price as rapidly as it did a few weeks ago. Today the product is retailing at \$14 per ton in this city. This would mean that the farmer gets about \$12 for his product in the bale. Timothy hay is worth about \$20. It is reported that hay is hard to secure at the above figures. The price this year to the Yakima grower is a bonanza. In years past he has taken as low as \$3 in the stack and sometimes he has sold his baled product at \$6 per ton. It is not believed that the price will go much higher for some time. Everybody has laid in a good supply for the winter. The trading mostly done now is to local users. The greater part of the alfalfa grown in Yakima this year is in the Sunnyside district. This is a good part of the crop there yet in the hands of the growers. The Seattle Times of Tuesday gives the following hay prices prevailing in that city: Eastern Washington timothy, \$24; alfalfa, \$19; wheat hay, \$19.—Yakima Republic.
