Thomas Fanning, aged 80 years, was murdered at Kansas City, in the room wherein he lived alone. Fanning left a large property, a portion of it being \$2100 in cash in the room where he was found dead, and certificates of deposit amounting to \$17,000. Not a valuable was touched, and apparently there had been no search for valuables, and the motive of the killing is a complete mystery. He was killed by blows on the head with a hatchet. Until old age compelled him to resign, Fanning's daily occupation, in spite of his wealth, was at day labor with pick and shovel. He loaned money and dealt in real estate. He was a bachelor.

WILL RETIRE ON \$1000 PER YEAR

LONG SERVICE OF THOMAS M. GATCH IS REWARDED.

Venerable President of Oregon Agricultural College May Retire From Active Service on \$1000 Per Year Provided for Aged Teachers by the Carnegie Fund—Began Teaching in 1856—Head of Oregon School for 10 Years.

The splendid reward which comes to long and faithful service as a teacher is about to be enjoyed by Dr. Thomas M. Gatch, the venerable president of Oregon Agricultural college. A dispatch from Corvallis says of Dr. Gatch's retirement:

A dispatch received this morning from the trustees at New York announces that Dr. Thomas M. Gatch, president of the Oregon agricultural college, has been elected to receive, at his option, the privilege of the Carnegie Foundation for the Aid of Teaching. Provision is made for Dr. Gatch to receive a retiring allowance of \$1000 a year, payable monthly, whenever the president may see fit to retire.

His intention of retiring next June from the presidency of the college was made known to the regents at the meeting of the board last July, and at that time resolutions commending him to the trustees of the foundation were passed by the board and forwarded to New York. There has been considerable correspondence since, for the purpose of establishing Dr. Gatch's record as an educator.

State and denominational universities are not on the list of the foundation, and persons from such institutions are not eligible to the fellowships and benefices of the fund, but on account of his extremely long and eminent service a special ruling was made in the present case and Dr. Gatch was admitted. From the information at hand it appears that Dr. Gatch can, by retiring, take advantage of the allowance beginning January 1, or he may select any future time in which to do so.

Dr. Gatch's proposed retirement from the presidency of the college is of his own election. Though he is still hale and hearty, and one of the hardest workers in the faculty of the institution, he wishes to be rid of the intricate and onerous duties that characterize the complex institution of which he has been the head for the past 10 years. Many members of the board have urged him to remain in the institution in a professorship, but he has not signified any purpose

of doing so, even should a place be officially tendered him.

His record as an educator will cover a period of 51 years when the coming spring is reached. It was in the spring of 1856 in the mining districts of California that he began, and every year from that time to the present he has been actively in the harness. He was graduated from the Ohio Wesleyan in 1855.

Whether or not Dr. Gatch will elect to begin participation in the Carnegie allowance when he gives up the presidency next June is not known.
