FREEWATER ADVICES

TROLLEY CARS EXPECTED
BY THE 22D OF JANUARY.

Building of a Cannery Is Now Assured
—Several Realty Deals—Municipal
Waterworks and Street Grading
Are Being Agitated—Active Measures
Endorsed for Controlling the
River; Another Meeting Will Be
Held January 3—Grange Elects Of-
ficers.

Freewater, Jan. 1.—The Walla
Walla Traction company, which is
building an electric line into Free-
water and Milton, has established its
grade to a point one and a half miles
from the city. The promoters of the
concern state that the steel will be
laid to Freewater within three weeks' time. Engineers are now engaged in
locating the track crossing on the O.
R. & N. tracks south of A. S. Pearson's
livery barn in this city. It will
not be long before the toot of the
whistle will be heard.

The Little 5-year-old daughter of
Sam Christianson died the middle of
last week and was buried Friday.

The citizens of Freewater are agitat-
ing street grading, and they are also
contemplating the establishment of a
municipal waterworks system.

All of the Freewater stores report an
excellent Christmas and holiday trade

real estate is on a livelier move than
at any time during the year.

country, states that the cannery will

already been raised, which is one-half
of the amount required. It is only a

rangements will be made for the
erection of the building.

to form a dyking district for that pur-
pose, provided the same be possible

and W. T. Shaw were appointed a
committee to investigate the possibil-
ity for forming such a district, and
to much territory this district should
embrace, provided it can be done un-
der the present law. The committee
will report at a meeting which has
been called for Thursday afternoon
January 3.

Moon Heat.

Many people suppose that moonlight
possesses great potency and has a won-
derful influence on or over animate
and inanimate things on our planet.
Such persons should remember that
moonlight is only reflected sunlight
and that the quality and quantity of
the light thus reflected are not what is
generally imagined. In fact, it is a
truth which has often been demon-
strated by the speculative astronomers that
it would take 618,000 full moons to
afford an amount of light equal to that
emitted by the sun, and, furthermore,
there is only sky space for 75,000 such
disks. However, it is in quantities so
small that it cannot be measured by
ordinary instruments. Flammarion
says that the amount of heat emitted
by a full moon while at its zenith can-
not be more than one eighty-thous-
andth of the amount that the sun sup-
plies when standing on the meridian
on a favorable day in July. Such be-
lieving the case, it is really surprising
that intelligent people should consider
that the moon has such a wonderful
"influence" over terrestrial affairs.

The Rhinoceros Bird.

Among the birds not commonly found
is the rhinoceros bird, from the Trans-
vaal. Buff plucker is its Dutch name.
Its habits are remarkable and its plum-
age unusual. Small flocks accompany
most of the large antelopes, the buffa-
loes and the rhinoceroses in South Af-
rica and run all over the creature's
bodies, picking off flies and insects.
When an enemy approaches the buff
pluckers sit in a line with heads raised
on the back of the animal they are at-
tending, like sparrows on a roof ridge,
and signal "the enemy in sight." The
plumage is curiously close, uniform and
compact, so much so that the bird has
an artificial look, as if covered with
painted satin and not with feathers.
The general tint of the body is cinnam-
on brown, with yellow beak and legs,
giving the color effect of a brown and
yellow iris.

A "Turner" Story.

Very few London dealers indeed are

picture in her house which she had al-
ways regarded as a Turner, and, desir-
ing to sell it, she offered it to five or
