CAN'T HOLD STOCK

J. R. SWITZLER LOSES
CASE IN WASHINGTON.

Supreme Court Holds That Stock
Once Delivered to a Railroad for
Shipment Is Not the Property of the
Original Owner, But of the Shipper
—Well Known Pioneer Horseman
Loses \$1995 Through Bogus Check.

A decision of the highest import-
ance to Oregon stockmen has just been
rendered against J. R. Switzler, the
well known horseman by the supreme
court of Washington. The Walla Walla
Union says of the matter:

The decision in the case of J. R.
Switzler against the Northern Pacific
railroad, tried in the superior court
of Walla Walla county last spring,
has been reversed by the supreme
court and ordered dismissed. The
case was instituted by Switzler to re-
cover the value of some horses pur-
chased of him by another party and
shipped from Kennewick east over
the defendant railroad.

After the horses had been shipped
he claimed to have learned that the
check given in payment for them was
worthless and that the horses had
been obtained by fraud. He notified
the railroad company to hold the
horses and not deliver them to the
consignee, but the railroad did not
know him as a party interested in the
shipment and delivered them to the
Western Livestock company, the con-
signee. Switzler claims to have lost
the value of the horses and sued the
railroad company to recover \$1995.

The superior court decided in favor
of the plaintiff and gave him judg-
ment for the amount. The railroad
company appealed to the supreme
court and it decided in favor of the
railroad company.

It seems that prior to this time
there had been but two decisions in
the United States on the point in-
volved, the supreme court of North
Carolina holding that the freight must
not be stopped and the supreme court
of Nebraska holding that it could be.
The above decision of the Washington
supreme court establishes the balance
of authority that when a railroad com-
pany accepts a shipment to a certain
named consignee, no claimant of the
property may stop the freight in trans-
it.

MORROW COUNTY HAPPENINGS.

Compiled From Latest Issues Heppner
Times and Gazette.

Wm. Frazier shipped a carload of
heavy draft horses from the Heppner
yards to Portland Monday. These
horses were all very fine ones for
which Mr. Frazier paid up as high as
\$200 a head.

Chester Warfield, nephew of W. T.
McNabb, in company with another
boy, was burning weeds on Mr. Mc-
Nabb's ranch below Lone, using pitch-
forks to handle the weeds, finishing
the work about noon last Saturday.
Boylike, they threw the pitchforks in-
to the air when the work was done,
and the fork used by young Warfield
came off the handle and the lad look-
ed up to see where the fork would
fall. It struck him above and between
the eyes, penetrating the skull and
causing hemorrhage of the brain. He
was taken to the Heppner sanatori-
um for treatment and is reported se-
riously injured.

W. B. Penland, of Medicine Hat,
Alberta, shipped from this city Sun-
day last, 250 head of range horses to
Medicine Hat, Alberta. The horses
were all purchased in Morrow county
principally from Newt Jones, Mike
Kennedy and Mel Humphreys. The
prices paid for the horses were \$10
for the yearlings and \$22 per head
for the grown stock. Mr. Penland
came to Heppner some time ago and
was intending to ship much sooner,
but owing to the car shortage was held
up here waiting for a time when he
could load out his stock. Owing to
a change in the schedule in Canadian
tariffs which took effect on the first
of the year in which the duty on
horses was raised \$5 per head on the
class of animals that Mr. Penland
was shipping, he was naturally very
anxious to get his horses through be-
fore the grip of the new law could
have effect for it would mean a clean
outlay of about \$2000. Ordinarily
range horses such as were formerly
raised in this county are fast dis-
appearing, and their places will be
taken with better stock. In fact, the
sooner they are gone the better it is
for the stockmen, for a poor horse
will eat as much grass as a good one,
consequently the good horse is much
more profitable.

TOO LONG IN PRISON.

Washington Man Not Released at End
of His Term.

Kept in prison for nearly a year be-
yond the time he should have been re-
leased George Finley has protested to
Warden Kincaid, says the Walla Walla
Bulletin. Kincaid has written to the
attorney general for advice and the
latter rendered an opinion that Finley
should have been given his liberty
February 15, 1906.

Finley was sentenced in Yakima
county February 16, 1903, to four
years for burglary. He appealed to
the supreme court, which in June,
1904, sustained the conviction. Under
the then existing laws the time
spent in the county jail as well as good
time allowance should have been
counted against the sentence, but were
not so credited by the prison officials
and Finley made no kick until Janu-
ary 1, this year.

This failure on the part of the con-
vict to protest may probably save the
state a damage suit for false impris-
onment.

GENERAL NEWS.

At Los Angeles, Henry Carter, his
daughter, Miss Mabel, and Charles E.
Abbott, ate canned beans while on a
camping trip, and all died from stom-
ach poisoning.

There are four regiments of negro
soldiers. One, the 24th Infantry, is
now in the Philippines, and the re-
mainder, the 9th and 10th cavalry and
the 25th Infantry, will be sent to the
Philippines in a short time.

Jason Smith, city marshal of Cam-
eron, Mo., was shot and fatally wound-
ed in a street fight in front of the
Cameron house by Ollie Snow a young
farmer. Snow was wounded by the
marshal, but escaped and is supposed
to be headed for St. Joseph.

During a fit of anger, Henry Stur-
gill, 16 years old, shot and killed his
brother Willie, aged 12, at their home
in Letcher county, Kentucky. After
committing the crime the lad walked
16 miles to Whitesburg, where he sur-
rendered to officers, saying he would
commit suicide if they did not lock
him up.

Betrayed by a plugged nickel stolen
from a child's savings bank, John
Dillon, 26 years of age, said by the
police to be an ex-convict, and Joseph
Chancy, 22, are under arrest at Chi-
cago charged with having committed
burglaries in a dozen west side homes,
stealing jewelry, silverware and furs
valued at \$10,000.

Beverly T. Galloway, chief of the
bureau of plant industry, as the re-
sult of seven years experimenting,
declares that camphor can be raised
in the United States as profusely and
of as excellent quality as in the island
of Formosa. As the result of his re-
port the government will set out 3000
trees in the interior of south central
Florida.

Five carloads of cotton on a Rock
Island train running into El Reno,
Ok., caught fire from engine sparks.
The engineer made a record run of
15 miles into El Reno as the train
crew was helpless, and the operator
at a way station telegraphed to the
fire department at El Reno, which
was on hand when the train pulled
in. About half the cotton was saved,
but damaged by smoke and water.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Grangeville, Idaho, is to have a
\$250,000 malting plant provided local
parties donate a site. Weinhard, of
Dayton, Wash., and Walla Walla
parties will build the plant.

Attalla is the name of a new town
which has recently sprung up three
miles south of Wallula. It is at the
junction of the Northern Pacific, the
W. & C. R. and O. R. & N. railways.

One year ago the school district at
John Day had a floating indebtedness
of \$2200, and a special tax of 20 mills
was voted which maintained the
schools and reduced the indebtedness
to \$500.

With the issue of January 3 the
Goldendale Sentinel entered upon its
29th year. The present publisher, W.
F. Byars has been in personal man-
agement for 15 years. Mr. Byars is
now sole owner.

Mrs. Clara H. Waldo, state lecturer
for the Grange, will on January 22
open a campaign in Hood River val-
ley, expecting to speak at every school
house therein during January and
February. Mrs. Waldo is a native of
Wasco county.

At Dayton, Wash., the Kerr-Gifford
company bought the Thomson and
Fontaine barley—25,000 sacks—in
bulk, at 91 cents per 100 pounds. The
same firm bought the Blessinger
Bros.' 7000 sacks, sacked, at 93 cents
per 100 pounds.

At Dayton, Wash., the 15-year-old
son of B. E. Elkins put the loaded
cylinder of a revolver (detached) so
close to a hot fire that one of the
cartridges exploded. The bullet struck
the boy in the right thigh, inflicting
a severe flesh wound.

The receipts of the Lewiston, Idaho,
postoffice during 1906 were \$21,362,
the largest in the history of that
place, and the largest in the state
outside of Boise. The third town in
the state as to size of postal receipts
is Pocatello. Lewiston is about to
have a new postmaster—J. L. Chap-
man, who will receive \$2600 salary
the first year.

State Land Commissioner C. J.
Munson, of Idaho, will on February
21 sell timber land at the Rathdrum

court house. The appraised value of
the timber advertised is \$162,162.35.
This includes 94,224,000 board feet of
lumber besides the ties and poles. The
terms of the sale are cash on day of
sale and the purchaser has 15 years
in which to remove the material from
the ground. No timber will be sold
for less than its appraised value.

Refrigerator Car Service.
Effective at once the O. R. & N.
company will inaugurate a weekly
refrigerator car service from Port-
land. The refrigerator cars will leave
Portland every Tuesday and will han-
dle perishable stuff for all points
east of Umatilla. A similar service
will be operated on the Washington
division.
