EIGHT-HOUR DAY MAY BE IN SIGHT

DECISION OF O. R. & N. OFFICIALS IS DEFERRED.

Thirty Day Truce Agreed Upon by the Employees and Officials—Brakemen and Conductors Will Perhaps Be Joined by the Firemen and Engineers—Trouble in Texas Is Settled.

When delegates from the conductors and brakemen met with O. R. & N. officials in Portland yesterday afternoon to consider the adoption of the eight-hour day on the Harriman lines, it was decided to postpone the final meeting and decision on the matter for 30 days.

The delegates have returned home greatly encouraged with the prospects of securing favorable consideration at the final meeting with the officials.

In the meantime efforts will be made to secure recognition for the shorter day on other lines included in the Harriman system and what may be called a concerted movement for an eight-hour day is now on. The local difference between the firemen and engineers on the Atlantic and Pacific in Texas has been settled, but the eight-hour day issue is still being considered.

It is now thought that when the brakemen and conductors present their case at the meeting 30 days from now, that the engineers and firemen will also send delegates to that meeting to urge a shorter day.

Texas Trouble Settled.

A special from Austin, Texas, says of the settlement of the trouble:

The strike of the firemen on the Southern Pacific is at an end. The men will go to work tomorrow noon. The basis of settlement was reached tonight during a conference between Vice Grand Master Shea for the firemen, and Vice Grand Master Willis for the engineers. The railway officials had no part in the final conclusion of the trouble. The firemen are said to have receded from their contention, except as to seniority to be from the time a man became a fireman, and an engineer from the time a man became an engineer.

When the engineers belonging to the firemen's union struck they lost their seniority with the engineers' brotherhood. The question of status of the engineers which struck and what the proposed engineers' brotherhood will make for those who took the strikers' places is a problem yet unsolved. Pending the decision of the question it was learned tonight that the firemen will return to work.

Settlement at Chicago.

A Chicago dispatch says: At a meeting of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen called by Interstate Commerce Commissioner Clark, the terms of settlement of the firemen's strike on the Southern Pacific lines were practically adopted. The terms, it is believed, will be given out tomorrow. Mr. Clark was the head of the conductors' brotherhood before his appointment as commissioner and it is believed his efforts to end the controversy resulted from his personal desire to see the strike called off.

The people of central Oregon are signing eagerly a resolution condemning the reclamation service for its act of claiming the whole Deschutes valley ostensibly for the water power needed to pump water out of the Umatilla river. The resolution is accompanied by a petition, which is part of the document, praying that right of way for the Oregon Trunk Line be granted to the company which will build the railroad along the river as originally surveyed from the Columbia to Madras.—Prineville Review.

After bequeathing nominal sums to his children, the will provides that the remainder of the property shall go to his wife, Mrs. Cordelia Ankeny, Mrs. Ankeny and Vincent Cook of Portland, a brother-in-law of the testator, are named as executors.

Senator Clark visited the ranch last year and is said to have tried to purchase it at that time. The consideration is said to be \$2,000,000.

The attorney general of New York is after the ice trust. This trust secured control of the Maine field, and caused the harvest of natural ice to be reduced from 1,500,000 to 500,000 tons. This ice was last summer increased from \$1.20 a ton at the landing depots to \$5 and \$6 a ton to the independent dealers who supply the retail trade. The cost of making artificial ice was \$1.30 a ton, and the trust charged \$6 for it. The profits of the company in July, 1906, were 71 per cent, on its total investment.
