FOR SUNDAY CLOSING LAW.

Ministers Now Preparing Bill to Present to Lawmakers.

A Sunday closing bill is being prepared by a committee of the Northwest Sabbath association, working in co-operation with a committee of the Ministerial association of Portland, says the Oregon Daily Journal. The proposed measure will provide for the closing of all saloons and places of amusement on Sunday and the partial closing of drug stores on the same day.

The bill was first formulated by Rev. Joseph H. Leiper, field secretary of the Northwest Sabbath association, and Rev. C. Nelson Allen of the Ministerial association. Rev. T. B. Ford was added to this committee at the request of the fathers of the measure, and the three have spent some little time in removing all possible defects from the construction and form of the bill. The measure will be introduced early in the session in the hopes that it will pass quickly through the two houses before the crush of business catches it and perhaps smotherers it in some committee. A strong delegation of lobbyists will go to Salem to assist the bill in its passage past the signatures of the two presiding officers.

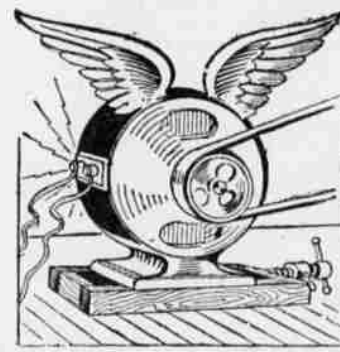
