Horses Starve in a Barn.
A mare and colt belonging to Sherm Keeney were found locked in a barn on the Green ranch south of town Tuesday. The mare was dead and the colt was so weak and hungry it could scarcely walk. The animals had been missing for about a month but Sherm thought that they had gone back on the range and no further attention was given the matter, as the fences were down. Pacific Coast Needs Laborers.
San Francisco, Jan. 16.—Though the labor situation in this city is rapidly assuming normal conditions, there is still a great demand for ordinary laborers not alone here, but all the coast and through the entire state. Bricklayers and carpenters are badly required and there is a great dearth of cement and iron structural workers. Construction is now going on in 60 steel and frame buildings from five to 16 stories in height, within six blocks of Union Square, but the work is handicapped owing to the absence of a sufficient number of laborers. The demand for clerical and office help is constant and increasing, as is also that for household help.

American Steel Invades Canada.
Detroit, Mich., Jan. 16.—The United States Steel Corporation has commenced the building of a city on the Canadian side of the river below Sandwich. A steel plant which will cost \$75,000,000 and employ 5000 men will be erected. The harbor facilities have been thoroughly investigated and found excellent and the corporation will build great car docks and coal storage facilities.

Loss of British Army Stores.
London, Jan. 16.—In a report issued today Major Marrison of the Royal Engineers, estimates the damage done by the recent fire at the equipment stores at Portsmouth at \$1,250,000. The entire equipment of an army corps was destroyed. The cause of the fire according to Mayor Marrison cannot be determined.

The washing house of the nitroglycerine plant at Point Isabel, near Berkeley, Cal., blew up. The superintendent, Ed Smith, was killed. No one else was injured.

**SCHOOL OPEN AFTER THE
QUARANTINE IS LIFTED.**

Scarlet Fever Has Been Practically Eradicated and All Fear Is Completely Allayed—Carload of Coal Relieves the Famine—No One Allowed More Than Five Sacks—Young Folks Greatly Enjoy the Good Sleighing Weather.

Athens, Jan. 14.—The public schools of this city have been opened after being closed for a few weeks on account of the prevalence of scarlet fever in and around the city.

The quarantine has been raised from nearly all of the homes, and it is believed that there will be no more trouble from the dread disease this winter.

The young people have been enjoying the last few days of sleighing to the full extent.

Barrett Sent Coal.
Representative C. A. Barrett, who is attending the session of the legislature sent a carload of coal to the city from Portland Tuesday, which will relieve the fuel shortage for some little time. No man was given more than five sacks from this cherished car, and it is being handled with the greatest care.

How the Reserve Was Defined.
How the great part of timberless land in Grant county was taken into the forest reserve has been a mystery to the people of Grant county. This is how it happened. The government had in its employ a forester, a Norwegian by the name of Erickson. Mr. Erickson had not been over long and could scarcely make himself understood in English. He went through Grant county and recommended that it be put in the forest reserve and it was done. Whole sections that do not contain enough trees to supply winter's fuel to a single family, are a part of the forest reserve because a forester recommended that those sections be put in the reserve.

Mr. Erickson made a ride through Long Creek and climbed a butte and took a survey of the country and then made his recommendations. He drove to the hitching rack, at his dinner at the hotel and drove off without feeding his horses. He had a few wraps, and when he came to a particularly cold, windy spot his driver remarked to him that it was disagreeably cold. He replied that it wasn't cold enough, and that it was the first time he had been comfortable since he left Norway.—Long Creek Ranger.

Mysterious Noises Continue.
The Ranger printed an account of the strange sounds that are heard in this end of Grant county two weeks ago and since then the unknown sounds have been attracting more attention than previously and all manner of stories are afloat as to their origin. Some of the newspapers have taken up the story and have tried to account for the mystery, but it is safe to say that their suppositions are not well founded.

There are very few people who live here who have not heard the strange thunder and some who affirm that they have experienced a trembling of the earth. The most pronounced effort came from the neighborhood below Ritter where last Sunday morning Mr. John Wright's family, declare that the dishes in the pantry rattled from the shaking and that they experienced a small earthquake.—Long Creek Ranger.
