TWO DIVORCE SUITS FILED.

Desertion Alleged in One Case, Adultery in the Other.

Two divorce suits were filed in the circuit court today, both being started by Messrs. Peterson & Peterson.

Emma B. Reed of Weston, desires a divorce from Arthur D. Reed, and alleges that the defendant deserted her in July, 1905, after they had been married but a few months. They were married at Mitchell, Wheeler county on March 30, 1905.

Mary Reynolds seeks separation from George C. Reynolds, to whom she was married at Weston in 1885. According to the allegations of the complaint the defendant committed adultery with a woman named Williams during the month of January, 1906, and is now living with the said woman at Connell, Wash. For this reason the plaintiff asks for a divorce.

WHOLESALE ANTI-TRUST SUITS.

Arkansas Urges Five Corporations Owe the State \$1,833,000.

Little Rock, Ark., Jan. 15.—Suits for alleged violation of the anti-trust laws of this state were filed this morning against Armour & Co., the Water-Pierce Oil Co., Hammond Packing Co., Morris & Co., and Cudahy Packing Co. for amounts aggregating \$1,833,000 each. The judgments asked are in the nature of penalties.

GREAT STRIKE THREATENS.

Miners Say Their Demands Must Be Met By Tomorrow.

Nevada, Cal., Jan. 15.—Labor Commissioner Stafford is here holding a conference with the operators in the hope of settling the miners' strike. If the miners' demands are not met by tomorrow the union will call out all pumpmen and surface men, and the mines will fill with water.

The companies are taking out the mines and preparing for a long siege. The miners say they are ready for a lockout and have plenty of money.

School Boy Who Did the Deed Immediately Killed.

Smolensk, Jan. 15.—Krollau, the chief of the rural police administration, was assassinated by a school boy named Borlokooff, as the chief was leaving a concert hall. An officer attending Krollau immediately killed the assassin.

Washington, Jan. 15.—Owing to the great inducements offered young men in the way of promotion, increased pay, etc., Commander W. F. White announces that naval enlistments are increasing at a very satisfactory rate.
