Among the Exchanges of the Inland Empire

In Desperate Straits for Cars.

The fuel famine at Sunnyside was relieved this week by a car of coal, the first sent to that place for almost two weeks. The coal was taken from here on the Sunnyside train. It is reported that hundreds of people are out of fuel and that if more of it does not arrive before the cold snap is over a raid will be made on a train on the main line of the Northern Pacific.

Separate Fair District.

Senator Hart of this city, is preparing a bill asking the legislature to make Baker county a separate fair district. This county is now combined with Harney and Grant. He asks \$1,800 for the Baker county fair and \$750 for Harney. The sums appropriated for the joint fair heretofore have been \$1200 for Baker and \$300 for Harney. Senator Hart shows, in support of his bill, that the fair board is always made up of men from the three counties and that on account of the distance it is almost impossible for the board to hold meetings.—Baker City Herald.

Slush Ice Stops Dam Work.

Work on the government dam up the river has been closed for the winter on account of the slush ice blocking a short distance below the works and backing up the river to such an extent that the sump in the excavation fills up and the men are drowned out of the works. Several efforts were made to remedy this condition, but they all proved useless. There were 140 men employed on the works and all have been let out. L. K. Burke, who came in from the works last night, stated that operations would begin again as soon as the river was free from ice.—Boise Capital News.

Condon is Out of Fuel.

The people of Condon have at last begun to feel the effect of the coal famine. Both the Arlington Lumber company and the Interior Warehouse are completely out of coal with but little prospect of securing any for some time to come. Freighters are hauling wood from the mountains and will be doubtless able to supply the residents of Condon with fuel until coal can be secured.—Condon Globe.

Wallowa's County High School.

The contract for the erection of the Wallowa county high school building has been let to C. H. Burggraf, the architect of Albany, Ore. The building will be erected in Enterprise and will be ready for occupancy October 1, 1907. It will cost \$15,000. It will be constructed of serpentine stone taken from the quarries near Enterprise.—Joseph Herald.
