NO PRELIMINARY WILL BE HELD

Colonel Raley Has Been Retained in
the McManus Case.

Since the shooting of Bob Estes,
practically no new developments have
come to light and apparently but lit-
tle more will now be brought out
until McManus is placed on trial in
the circuit court.

District Attorney Phelps has been
making investigations in the case
since his return from western Oregon.
Today he stated that a preliminary
examination will not be held, but that
instead he will handle the case him-
self, as under the law he has the
powers of a grand jury in such mat-
ters.

Aside from Judge James A. Fee,
Colonel J. H. Raley has also been
retained for the defense of McManus,
and when the case comes to trial a
highly interesting legal battle will un-
doubtedly occur. But it is not at all
probable that the case will be tried
at this term of court, as the defense
will probably want the case to go over
until next term so as to allow the at-
torneys to prepare themselves. Both
Judge Fee and Colonel Raley have
been busily occupied during the last
week or more on the flood damage
case, in which they appear for op-
posite sides.

The next term of circuit court will
convene here on the second Monday
in April, as a bill has already been
passed by the legislature changing
the times for the holding of the jury
sessions in this county. Hereafter
the January term will commence on
the second Monday, the spring term
on the second Monday in April, as
stated above, and the fall term on
the third Monday in September.

In Morrow county the various terms
will commence one week earlier than
in the past.

William Harris Dead.

William Harris, an inmate of the
county hospital, died at that place at
noon today. He was an old man and
had been there for a year. The body
is now at the Baker & Folsom pa-
lors and it is understood the remains
will be shipped.
