FIVE MEN WERE ARRAIGNED.

McManus and Others Will Plead on Monday Next.

In the circuit court this morning a criminal session was held and five accused men were brought up for arraignment.

John P. McManus was first brought into court to plead to the charge of murder now standing against him. However, one of his attorneys, Judge Fee, was absent from the city and at the request of Colonel J. H. Raley, the other counsel, the time for pleading was set for 1:30 Monday afternoon.

Herbert Watson was the next to have his case called. He was charged with having stolen a watch from Frank Duprat. After a brief conference with his lawyer, J. R. Raley, the prisoner entered a plea of guilty. The time for sentencing was set for 1:30 Monday afternoon.

Thomas Evans, another young man, was accused of having tried to pass a bad check on some people in Echo and he pleaded guilty to the charge. The time for sentencing him was also set for 1:30 Monday. The prisoner was represented in court by W. C. E. Pruitt.

C. C. Sabin, alias J. B. Kerr, was the third prisoner. He was indicted under the name of Kerr for living off the earnings of a prostitute. But when asked by the court if that was his true name he said no, and gave his real cognomen as C. C. Sabin. He said he desired to secure counsel and would have a lawyer by Monday. His bail was fixed at \$250. The principal witness against the prisoner is Joste Lamont, with whom he is said to have lived, and District Attorney Phelps asked that she too be placed under bonds to appear at the trial. The court ordered that she appear at 1:30.

Walter Irwin, accused of having robbed J. W. Myrick of \$40 was then arraigned and took until Monday at 1:30 to plead. His bail was fixed at \$500. Irwin is being defended by W. C. E. Pruitt.

ANKENY PRESIDED.

Washington Senator Caused Merriment in Congress.

Senator Levi K. Ankeny, of Walla Walla, in private life a disciple of Isaac Walton and president of half a dozen banks, caused considerable amusement in the senate one day last week when he presided in the absence of Vice President Fairbanks, says a Washington, D. C., report to coast papers.

Mr. Fairbanks seized a moment to retire when things looked very favorable for a long and dry discussion. Senator "Smiling Tom" Patterson of Colorado, had the floor and seemed wound up for one of his lengthy speeches. Hardly had the door swung behind Mr. Fairbanks before Mr. Patterson suddenly stopped talking and sat down.

Immediately a half dozen senators were on their feet clamoring for recognition, but Senator Heyburn gained the desired point, asked for unanimous consent to take up a measure, and made a short explanation of it. Presiding Officer Ankeny squirmed in embarrassment, let his gavel fall and asked:

"You have heard the proposition, gentlemen. What is the pleasure of the meeting?"

A gentle titter ran through the senate chamber, for it was evident that Senator Ankeny believed he was presiding at a meeting of the board of directors of one of his banks. He was the most pleased man in the senate when Mr. Fairbanks returned and relieved him of his duties.

Caleb Powers Anniversary.

Louisville, Ky., March 9.—Caleb Powers, Kentucky's most noted prisoner, will tomorrow complete seven years of confinement in Kentucky jails. It was on March 10, 1900, that he was arrested on the charge of complicity in the assassination of Governor Goebel. March 10, 1907, finds him still in jail waiting for the fourth trial of his case, which is now set for the June term of court at Georgetown. During the seven years of his imprisonment Powers has occupied jails in Lexington, Louisville, Frankfort, Georgetown and Newport. He has been tried three times, and has been twice sentenced to life imprisonment and once given the death penalty.

FIRST CARGO OF SHINGLES.

Seattle Will Ship Boat Load to Texas Via San Francisco.

For the first time in the history of local lumber movements, a ship will sail from Puget Sound with a cargo of shingles only, says Seattle News. The steamship Olympia, Capt. Alfred Crowsley, is now at Bellingham loading a shipment of 15,000,000 shingles which have laid in dry kilns since last August because of the owner's inability to secure rail transportation. The shingles will be taken to San Francisco and shipped by rail over the Southern Pacific to points in Texas. The freight bill on this large cargo of shingles from Bellingham to San Francisco will be \$18,750.

The rail rate from San Francisco to Texas points is 13.50 more per thousand than the rate from Bellingham to Texas.

Captain Crowsley states that the shingle men have despaired of securing cars and have taken this means of shipping shingles at an enormous financial sacrifice.

New York, March 9.—Prof. T. W. Richards, who has been chosen to go to Germany this year under the agreement entered into between the German emperor and Harvard University for the exchange of instructors, sailed for Europe today. He will go to the University of Berlin and will give there a course of lectures in chemistry on "The Fundamental Constants of Physical Chemistry." The course will consist of two lectures a week, but the greater part of his work will consist in directing the advanced searches of a few students.
