WHITMAN GLEE CLUB COMING.

Tour of the Inland Empire Will Be Made During Easter Vacation.

Arrangements have been made for a successful tour of the Whitman college glee club during the Easter vacation which begins March 2, says the Walla Walla Statesman.

Calvin Thomason, president of the club, returned yesterday from Spokane and other cities north of here, where he has been making dates and getting guarantees for concerts.

He reports that he sold \$125 worth of tickets at Spokane and got satisfactory cash guarantees from Pullman and Ritzville. Colfax also made an acceptable proposition.

The first trip to be taken will be south before the vacation. It will cover Weston and Pendleton on March 22 and 23. At Weston the concert is being taken up by the associated students of the normal school, who announce that they will make the crowd a large and enthusiastic one.

In Pendleton the concert will be boosted by the debating team of the high school and former Whitman students living in Pendleton.

GYMNASIUM REVIVAL.

Director Shockley Working to Secure New Members for Classes.

An effort is now being made to increase the attendance at the gymnasium classes in order to justify retaining Physical Director Shockley during the remainder of the spring. While several of the gym classes have continued to work very faithfully, others have dropped out and it will be necessary to secure a revival of interest in order to retain an instructor.

It is proposed to again organize an evening class from among the young men and Director Shockley is in hopes of being able to do so. Also, there is room for several more members in the 5 o'clock men's class, which meets on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

At a meeting of the gymnasium committee held last evening it was decided to make an effort to revive interest in the gymnasium work between now and April 1. At that time should the attendance be satisfactory the services of Mr. Shockley will be continued, otherwise the gymnasium will be closed for regular class work for the remainder of the season.

Will Have a New Rector.

The vestry of the Church of the Redeemer is now in correspondence with several able ministers and it is hoped to be able to secure a permanent rector for the church within a few weeks.

To Increase W. & C. R. Service. Efforts are being made to put two daily trains in service on the W. & C. R. between Walla Walla and Pasco. The increasing business in that direction has made the second train necessary and the people of Pasco hope to secure the additional facilities soon.

BAND CONCERT SUNDAY.

Excellent Program by Eagles' Band Sunday Afternoon at 3 O'clock.

The Eagles' band under the direction of Prof. B. F. Driscoll, will render an excellent program of high class music at Eagles' hall on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Among the numbers to be given will be the grand selection "Maritana," "Poet and Peasant" overture, the intermezzo from Cavalleria Rusticana, always a favorite, and by request, a grand descriptive fantasia, "A Hunting Scene," wherein the pleasure of the hunt are realistically pictured by means of the instruments.

Assisting the band will be Mrs. B. F. Driscoll, who will sing "Counsel to Nina," a delightful waltz song. Mr. Driscoll will also play a fantasia on "Killarney" and a brand new quartet will render a selection.

It is hoped that a large audience will greet the concert and encourage the band boys, who are working hard to have a band of which Pendleton may be proud on all occasions.

BEASTLINESS CHARGED.

Alleged Degenerate From Echo Lodged in Jail.

Jack Darby, a man about 40 years of age and a transient, is now held at the county jail upon the charge of sodomy. He was brought up last evening from Echo by the marshal of that town after he had been arraigned in the justice's court there and bound over to the circuit court.

The crime of which Darby is accused is a heathly one and aroused a strong feeling of loathing among the people of Echo. The victim of his practice was Robert Benedict, a lad of 8 or 9 years who lives at Echo. On being examined in the justice's court at Echo, Darby's bail was fixed at \$1000, and being unable to obtain the same he was ordered to jail. The penalty for his crime is imprisonment in the penitentiary for a term of from one to five years.

Funeral of Roy Knight.

This afternoon the funeral of the late Roy Knight was held from the Church of the Redeemer and was largely attended by the friends and associates of the deceased young man. The funeral was under the auspices of the Woodmen lodge and the Woodcraft circle to which he belonged. The members of the Woodmen uniformed degree team attended in a body, as did also a team of young ladies from the circle.

HOBBS IS RELEASED.

Insufficient Evidence and Sympathy for Family Cause Action.

George Hobbs, arrested here Sunday evening on a charge of having robbed the Log Cabin saloon, was today released from custody at the instance of District Attorney Phelps. After fully investigating the case the district attorney found that the evidence against Hobbs was most too meager to secure a conviction should he stand trial, and this fact, together with sympathy for the family of the accused man lead to his release from custody.

Mr. and Mrs. Hobbs are formerly of Walla Walla, and the latter is of a well known and highly respected family there, while Hobbs is also well related, being a nephew of Judge Brents.

Died at Walla Walla.

William Gibson, of Wasco, Oregon, died at the Walla Walla hospital shortly before 1 o'clock this morning from tuberculosis, says the Walla Walla Statesman. Gibson had been in the hospital but nine days, having just returned from Arizona where he went in search of health. Although his case was regarded as hopeless, it was not thought he would pass away so quickly.
