Mixed Paving Probable at Yakima.

A resolution will be introduced at the next meeting of the city council to proceed with the paving of Yakima avenue and certain other business streets. It is likely that the resolution will be adopted, that the materials will be in accord with the report of the committee composed of Councilmen Schott and Keck, which recently made a tour of inspection, and that the actual work of paving the streets will be under way within a couple of months, barring bad luck of some kind.

The council committee recommended the use of asphalt for Yakima avenue, and the natural basalt rock found in this vicinity for certain side streets, the use of the latter to depend upon the report of the paving expert in regard to its availability.

W. B. Chase, an expert paving man, now in charge of the work of paving in Boise and two or three other Northwest cities, was engaged to come here and make the plans for paving, get up the specifications and pass on the basalt rock.

Mr. Chase was seen this afternoon by a Republic reporter, and said: "I will start tomorrow with a crew of men to make the surveys on Yakima avenue and the side streets on the east side of town. My estimates will be turned over to the council for their action. Asphalt paving is considered a high grade street and I believe will give the greatest satisfaction. I do not favor wooden blocks. Bitulithic is good and has its friends. The native stone shown to me this morning appears to be everlasting. No definite action has yet been taken in the matter, however.—Yakima Republic.

Hurt by a Distant Blast.

Saturday, while laborers were blasting stumps in section 1 of the Tieton project, E. Swanson was standing across the river from where the work was going on, and while watching the men set off a blast was struck on the right side of his chest and knocked unconscious. It has since been ascertained that at least one of his ribs was fractured, and that he may be suffering from internal injuries. At present he is at the sanitarium under surgical care.

The men at work on the stump thought they were exerting all the care necessary, and certainly had no idea that any flying stones would cross the river and do bodily injury. A physician who examined Swanson immediately after he was struck, said that if the piece of rock had struck him on the other side of the chest, over the heart, it would have killed him.—Yakima Republic.
