NEWS OF WESTON ATHENA BREVITIES

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE WILL MEET SATURDAY.

Glee Club Will Entertain Tonight—Schumann Concert Company Gave a Splendid Entertainment—Normal College Will Be Written Up for Portland Paper—Main Street Will Be Paved With Crushed Rock for 1500 Feet.

Weston, March 21.—Tonight the Whitman College Glee club of Walla Walla will appear at the Normal chapel and the entertainment is being looked forward to with much pleasure, as the club has 13 very fine voices this year, and some good special work will be seen.

Concert Last Night.

This is an altogether eventful week at the Normal as the Schumann Ladies' Concert company appeared here last evening, and they were highly pleasing to the large audience.

Teachers Saturday.

Teachers who come to attend the institute Saturday will be given a luncheon at the Normal, and they will be entertained in various ways by the school.

Regarding Normal Schools.

The latter part of the week the schools will be inspected by a representative of a Portland paper, which paper is securing facts for publication concerning every normal school in the state.

To Improve Main Street.

The city council has advertised for bids for the improvement of Main street with crushed rock, for a distance of about 1500 feet. The street will be properly graded and a surface dressing of crushed rock six inches deep laid from curb to curb. The cost of the work will be paid out of the city treasury, and assessed against adjacent property, the owners of which may pay their respective assessments in cash or in annual installments for 10 years with interest.

The city owns a rock crusher and quarry, which will be placed at the disposal of the successful contractor free of charge. Bids will be opened April 3.

New Galveston-Havana Line.

Galveston, March 21.—With the sailing from Galveston this week of the steamer Gotthard, the Lykes Steamship company will inaugurate its new service between this port and Havana. General cargo of all descriptions will be handled by the new line, which for the present will maintain a schedule of departures at intervals of 12 days. The new service makes two regular lines between Galveston and northern Cuban ports and one line to southern Cuban ports.

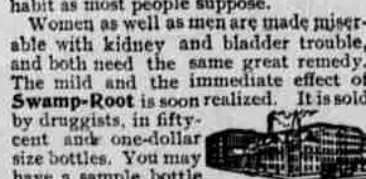
