Among the Exchanges of the Inland Empire High School Field Meet May 17-18. J. A. Churchill has just returned from La Grande, where he went to attend a conference of the principals of the various schools in eastern Oregon, with a view to selecting the location for the next eastern Oregon field meet. Those in attendance were E. E. Bragg, county superintendent of La Grande; J. F. Reynolds, of Island City; Omen Bishop of Union and Prof. Churchill. The time set is May 17 and 18; there will be a declamatory contest in the evening of May 17, and the day following will be entirely given up to contests on the track. Gold medals will be awarded to winners of first, silver medals to winners of second, and thirds will be consoled with ribbons. It is not known whether Pendleton will enter or not as Principal J. S. Lenders was not present at the conference, and has not been heard from since. Yesterday it was learned that Cove would send a team for both the track meet and the contest on the stadium, and it is expected that Pendleton will follow in a few days. This will make six teams to compete, which will make this one of the most interesting gatherings the Baker boys have had the pleasure of attending.—Baker City Herald. Will Ship by Rail by April 1. Within a few days, and not later than April 1, the Riparia-Lewiston railroad will be used in moving grain from the warehouses here. At the opening of the season there were 110,000 sacks stored here, but 50,000 sacks have been moved by the boats. Tracklaying was stopped at this point several weeks ago when the washouts on the main line occurred but will resume here this week, when, after the bridge across the creek here is completed, the tracklaying can be resumed. The work on the grading between here and Lewiston is now rapidly drawing to a close. Only three camps remain and they will complete their work by April 15.—Lewiston Tribune (Almota Corner). Much Petrified Wood. Petrified wood is often found along the river; in fact, there is so much of it near the old coal diggings on the Halvor place, a few miles below town, that it is called the "petrified forest." The finest sample of petrified wood we have seen was shown us this morning by Jerry Moore, a young man whose home is in Arkansas, but who has been working over in Khektah county. He found it near Hewitt's Landing in the White Salmon section and was offered \$5 for it when he reached town. He, however, refused it, saying he was going to send it home.—The Dalles Chronicle. Surveying Orchard Cut-off. The locating party in charge of assistant Engineer G. T. Morris, which has been surveying a route for the main line between Orchard and Boise, has moved its camp from South Boise several miles nearer Orchard. The party will reach Boise again about April 1. Work has been started on the cement platform and walks around the depot. These, with the parks that will be laid out between the passenger depot and the freight office, will make a great improvement. C. H. Seaver, who has been chief clerk in the office of Assistant Engineer Ferrer, of the Short Line, has resigned to take a position with the educational department of the MacMillan company of New York, with headquarters for the present at Boise. John R. McKinney has been transferred from Caldwell to take his place. H. W. McChesney, instrument man in the local engineering office of the Short Line, has been transferred to the supervising engineer's office at Pocatello. No Case on Record.
