OREGON BOARD TAKING LESSONS

TRI-STATE MEETING OF RAILROAD COMMISSIONS

Oregon and Montana Board in Session With the Washington Board at Olympia—Board of the Three States Will Adopt Uniform Rules and Make Uniform Reports—Oregon Commission Is Studying Hard.

That the Oregon Railroad Commission intends to get down to business early is shown by the fact that it is studying practical methods from the Washington commission. A dispatch from Olympia says of the joint meeting of the Oregon, Montana and Washington commissions:

The members and secretaries of the new railway commissions of Montana and Oregon spent a busy day here today studying, with J. C. Lawrence and Jesse T. Jones, Washington railroad commissioners, the methods adopted by this state's board. Chairman J. C. Fairchild of the Washington commission, who has been at Bellingham, returned late this afternoon. Tonight the visiting officials and a number of newspaper correspondents were guests of the Washington commission at dinner.

The commission discussed the different powers and authority and in detail went into the matter of railroad reports. So far as the several laws will permit similar blanks will be used in the three states. By using the same system a much better check will be had on the roads.

Commission System Explained.

The importance of this fact is recognized by those who have had occasion to see how railroad-made figures are used to give different results for different conditions. The whole office system methods of handling and filing correspondence, of keeping records and invoices were carefully explained to the visitors by the local commissioners.

Nearly the whole afternoon was taken up in the engineer's office, where H. P. Gillette, expert engineer of the commission, explained in detail the work he and his force of engineers and right of way men have been doing for months past in making up data of the actual cost of the various roads. Mr. Gillette explained the figures he secured from the railroads' own vouchers and records at headquarters and how these vouchers and expenditures have been checked.

He told of the careful inspection by trackmen of all railroad property in this state, of the appraisements made, not only to give values of railroad property, but to show the values of adjoining property privately owned.

The whole explanation was listened to most attentively, the visitors not leaving the office until two hours after the usual closing time. Undoubtedly the visit will be of a great deal of assistance to the new commissioners and will be of great benefit to the Washington commission and people of this state if harmonious action in the three states results.

One important result of the conference will probably be uniformity in the three states with respect to the form of reports the railroads will be asked to make.

GENERAL NEWS.

A trolley car ran down an automobile at Milwaukee, Wis., seriously injuring the inmates, who were Frederick Pabst, the millionaire brewer, and Mrs. Leon Barnickel. Both will recover.

Fifteen hundred woodworkers are in strike at Dubuque, Iowa, for a nine-hour day and increase in wages. One of the plants, which manufactures wooden dishes, is the largest in the world.

When summoned before a board of his friends assembled to inquire into his sanity, H. F. Stoughton, a prosperous farmer of Logansport, Ind., fell in a fit and when revived was speechless and paralyzed. He died a few hours later.

A silk manufacturers' merger with a capital of \$22,500,000 was announced in New York city April 11. The merger thus far includes the York and Monarch mills in the city, and Carlisle, Fleetwood and Reynolds mill in the state. The purchaser is the American Silk Manufacturing company, of New York. Plans are under way for the merging of a total of 20 mills, principally in Pennsylvania.

The New Zealand Arbitration act has made strikes impossible. It regulates wages and hours in every trade. An employer who does not conform to the conditions is liable to a fine of \$1000, while a workman may be fined \$50, and if a trade union is party to the breach it is fined on a higher scale than an employer. There has been no strike in New Zealand since this act was passed. It makes sweating and underpay impossible.

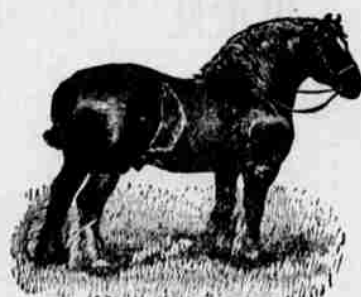
