New Lake Covers 15,000 Acres. A new lake appears on the latest map of Idaho—Lake Walcott, and although an artificial body of water, it is the largest lake in southern Idaho. Its area is three times greater than that of big Payette lake in the western part of the state, and is three-fourths the size of Jackson lake in Wyoming.

Lake Walcott is created by the back water above the great Minidoka dam recently constructed by the reclamation service. It covers about 15,000 acres, is 35 miles long and for more than seven miles it has a width of about two miles.

Near the headgates and dam plans are being made for tree planting and otherwise beautifying the shores. Lands bordering the lake will later be water by means of pumps, thus increasing the attractions of the lake.

The fish commission will be asked to stock the lake with fish. Already ducks and geese in large numbers are making it their summer headquarters. The country about the lake, until the advent of the reclamation service about three years ago was an uninhabited desert. Today a population of 10,000 is living there. Three thriving towns have sprung up and a new railroad has been constructed.

The Minidoka project promises to become one of the most thickly settled agricultural districts in the state, and Lake Walcott will doubtless in time be a popular summer resort for people living in that part of Idaho.—Focatello Tribune.

Floater Identified.

It was learned for a certainty this evening that the body taken from the Snake river near Starbuck, Wash., several days ago, and buried day before yesterday, owing to the decomposed condition, was that of Phillip Hammond, an Oregon Railroad & Navigation company surveyor, drowned here about six weeks ago while attempting to cross the Clearwater river in a skiff. The body was identified by one boat, the other having come off through the decomposed condition, a woolen undershirt and the teeth. The body had no trousers on, they having probably been torn off. The remains will probably be exhumed and either brought here for burial or shipped to Minneapolis, Minn., Hammond's home.—Lewiston Teller.

May Abandon Beaver Creek Project. Two bids for the Beaver creek bonds were received at the council meeting last night, one from Ladd & Bush of Salem, offering to take \$25,000 of the issue at par, the other

from the Eastern Oregon Trust & Savings Bank of La Grande, for the entire issue, \$150,000, at par. After thorough discussion it was decided to suspend action on accepting the bond offers until the next regular meeting, which would give the council time to consider the possibility of augmenting the city's water supply by boring artesian wells. It was stated that owing to the success of the O. R. & N. well in this city, just completed, water might be secured from this source much cheaper than by going to Beaver creek. Several parties have already offered the city sites for such a well, if the city decides to make the experiment. A committee was instructed to investigate and report as to the probable cost of two wells flowing the same amount of water as the O. R. & N. well, would supply the city.—La Grande Observer.

May Pay the Street Policies

The United Artisan lodge of this city, in which Rev. Homer M. Street holds a \$2000 policy, has decided, we are given to understand, to pay the money over to Mrs. Street and trust to the future to bring the body of the unfortunate man to light. A careful investigation has been made by the county officers and representatives of the Artisans, and at a recent meeting of the lodge, which decided to pay the widow in full. Mrs. Street has a valuable property on the Matoles, but without her husband to develop its resources she must depend entirely upon hired help. The Bankers' life, in which he also carried a \$4,000 policy, is likewise making inquiries as to the standing of Mr. Street, and is doubtless contemplating paying over the amount of the policy to the widow.—Prineville Review.

Ed W. Jones Killed.

Ed W. Jones, a workman at the gravel pit of the Three Tree Point Gravel company, located at Three Tree Point, fell a distance of 85 feet yesterday morning and was almost instantly killed. Jones was working on a trestle at the time. It was his duty to keep the flume leading from the gravel pit to the bunkers from overflowing. He was engaged at his work when his foot slipped and he fell to the ground below.

His wife, standing within sight of the place, saw him fall. With shrieks she ran to him. The foreman of the pit was attracted by her screams and hurried out to ascertain the cause. He found the wife holding her husband's head in her arms and sobbing

piteously. By the time the foreman reached the scene Jones was dead. Jones was from La Grande, Oregon.—Seattle Star.

Shearing in Union County.

Sheep shearing started in earnest this week. Two crews of 12 and 13 men respectively have started to work and by May 15 they expect to finish shearing flocks aggregating 38,000 sheep. One of the crews has just finished shearing 38,000 sheep in the Badger Pocket country, the work being performed in fast time. Another flock of 8000 sheep will be sheared after May 15. This flock is pastured in Johnson canyon and is owned by Wilson & McLennan.

On account of the long, cold winter, the wool this year is not as heavy as usual, but the quality is above the average, so that what is lacking in quantity will be made up by the better price that the product will bring. Indications now are that the clip will be sold at a fraction above the price prevailing last year.—La Grande Observer.

Important Fish Decision.

The supreme court has handed down an opinion affirming the decision of the lower court, and sustaining the contention of the state game warden who had been sued for damages because he liberated 750,000 fish captured from Snake river and kept in ponds near by. The suit was entitled J. Sherwood, appellant, vs. W. N. Stephens, respondent. The court held that wild fish and game being public and that a man could not acquire title to same as he would to chattels. It further held that a man had no right to build a dam on a public stream and endeavor thereby to secure title to the fish therein.—Boise Capital-News.

Yakima Shearers Get 10 Cents. Sheep shearers in the Yakima valley are getting but 10 cents per head for shearing sheep. The report yesterday that the men had struck for 14 1/2 cents, and were threatening to leave the country unless they received this advance in price is not true, according to Stanley Coffin. Sheep shearers have received an advance of 1 1/2 cents in the past week. They were formerly paid 8 1/2 cents per head, but this price has been advanced to 10.—Yakima Republic.
