### SELLS-FLOTO SHOW, JUNE 1.

Big Circus Comes to Pendleton Next Week

The Sells-Floto shows, which come to Pendleton June 1, carry a large amount of live stock. Horses numbering 300 have to be cared for every day. It takes tons of provender to feed these horses and the menagerie. The animals of the menagerie are generally of the most interest. The hardest and longest lived and most intelligent said to be the elephant. Some of the largest of this show are used to push the heavy wagons and cages about the "lot" when the show is setting up. One morning an elephant became enraged at his driver and wheeled quickly and struck at the man with his trunk. The beady eyes of the animal glistened as he trumpeted his anger. The keeper lashed the big brute with his whip and subdued him without any damage being done. Had the man been hit by the blow it would have killed him. When an elephant gets so bad that he is dangerous, the owners have the animal killed, and a substitute takes his place, although the killing of an elephant means a loss of several thousand dollars.

The most delicate animal is the giraffe. They take cold easily and often die of hasty consumption. Seals are hardy, but are difficult to train. Probably the hardest animal to train is the wild African zebra. They will not give up to man. They will be killed before they will obey. Sometimes hybrids are seen, and they resemble the full blooded animal.

The Sells-Floto shows carry everything that can be found in a good-sized city. With the aggregation is a blacksmith, a barber, harnessmaker, two painters, glider, cooks, bakers, electricians, a minister, the show's own attorney and its two veterinary doctors, besides its own family physician.

Not many shows carry their own electric light plant. This is a feature of the Sells-Floto shows, and the big tent is as light as day within. Linemen are employed to keep the plant in running order.

No one who is not in touch with the show can form any idea of the enormity of it. It is a small city in itself, constantly on the move, but with all kinds of methodical provisions for its running.

Two exhibits are given daily, rain or shine, and in case of inclement weather, waterproof tents insure ample protection and comfort.

### PEWS HAVE ARRIVED.

Entire Equipment and Furnishings Here But Pipe Organ.

With the arrival of the pews for the new Methodist church yesterday, all the material from outside points is now here with exception of the pipe organ. The pews were made in Minneapolis at a cost of \$270, and are of white oak and circular in shape. It was feared for some time that the seats might not arrive in time for dedication day, but now nothing will be left to hinder the workmen in having the church ready for occupancy on June 1 unless the organ should fail to arrive, but no fear is expressed on that ground, as the instrument is now in Portland.

Crops are in excellent condition in the Cambridge country and the Pendleton colony is prosperous and contented. He is delighted with that country and believes it will be come one of the noted wheat districts of the northwest.

### FRED VINCENT, RESCUER.

Pendleton Boy Assisted in Saving Life of Only Survivor in a Drowning Accident at Seattle.

Fred Vincent of this city, a student of Washington university, at Seattle, was one of the rescuers who saved the life of the only survivor of an accident in which three students were drowned in Lake Washington, Seattle, yesterday.

A Seattle dispatch says of the accident:

"Three young college students, two men and a girl, were drowned in a canoeing accident on Lake Washington today. Another young man barely escaped with the assistance of friends who went to his rescue in a sailboat while a squall was raging on the lake. The two men were J. F. Goshorn, son of Robert Goshorn, editor of the Kallispell (Mont.) Interlake, and a junior at Stanford university, and Glen Jacqueth, son of a Kallispell, Mont., engineer, and a sophomore student at the same institution. The girl was Edith Vogt, a junior student in the University of Washington.

These three, with Eugene White, another Washington university student, were on the lake in a small canoe, when a sudden squall came up and struck them. The canoe filled with water and sank, leaving the occupants struggling in the choppy waves. White almost succeeded in getting the girl to the canoe, when both the other men threw their arms around him and the four sank. White alone coming up.

Three students in a small sailboat made a sensational rescue, picking him up while the boat was going at a high speed." Fred Vincent was one of the three rescuers who saved White's life. As the sailboat speeded past White, Vincent reached out and grabbed the drowning man by the clothes and hauled him into the small boat at a risk of capsizing it.
