Trusty Escaped from Penitentiary. Albert Gilbert, a trusted convict at the penitentiary, escaped from that institution last night about 9 o'clock and although strenuous efforts have been made, no trace of the missing man has been found.

Gilbert is a Swede and was sentenced from Idaho county June 1, 1901, to serve a life term for murder in the second degree.

His absence was reported at Warden Whitney's office at 10 o'clock by Dave Norwood, a prisoner with whom Gilbert worked in the power house. He stated he could not find Gilbert to bring him to supper and had not seen him since 9 o'clock.

Guards were at once detailed to make a careful search of the yard and outbuildings, but secured no trace of the escaped convict.

Gilbert is 5 feet 3 inches in height, is light complexioned and has light hair and blue eyes. His walk is very peculiar as he sort of stumbles along. His legs are slightly bowed and he fully looks his age.—Boise Capital-News.

Moving Into Toppenish. Toppenish people are busily engaged in moving their homes from the leased lands of the reservation to the new townsite, title to which has been perfected. The residents, lost no time in buying sites for their homes and the whole city will be safely established within the limits of the corporation in a short time.

Houses, barns and even shade trees are sharing in the general spring moving process, the transplanting of the trees being done with great care so that none of them will suffer in the process.

Some amusing incidents have marked the work or house moving. It has not been unusual for a father of a family to have his breakfast on the reservation as in the past, find his lunch in a home en route to its new site, and take dinner on the lot he has purchased.—Yakima Republic.

Seven Devils Reserve Notes. J. B. Lafferty, supervisor of the Seven Devils forest reserve, reports the making of several new allotments to sheep and cattle men of grazing lands in that territory. In that reserve he reports there are approximately 150,000 head of sheep and 125,000 head of cattle and horses. Many cattlemen in the section adjacent to Pollock and White Bird are granted year-round permits. On this reserve there are 13 guards and two deputy rangers and one assistant. Part of the work now is the marking

of timber that may be cut and the issuance of permits to cut and use it for ranch and mine purposes. A noticeable result of the supervising of the forests is the infrequency of fires, as shown by last season's reports.—Wesler Signal.

Fumigation Sets a Fire. Mr. Gibson, living a few miles northwest of Laird had the misfortune of having his house and all its contents burned Tuesday afternoon. Just how the fire occurred is not known, but Mrs. Gibson was fumigating the up-stairs and had the sulphur in a bucket which she had placed upon the bottom of a granite tub. She had put some chips in the bucket to keep the sulphur burning and it is thought that a spark might have caught the paper. Mrs. Gibson's watch was all she saved from the wreck. We understand there was no insurance.—Lewiston Chronicle.

Ten Years for Safe Blowing. James Murphy, the tallest of the two men who blew up Lauterbach's safe, pleaded guilty before Judge Steele and was sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary.

Burke, the other party, confessed giving full details of the crime, and for safety was transferred to Lewiston jail. Murphy has (according to Burke) sworn to kill him for "peachin'" if he has to go to the ends of the earth. By confessing Burke secures his liberty.—Kendrick Gazette.
