LINE TO YELLOWSTONE PARK.

Branch of Harriman Road to Southern Entrance Almost Completed.

Yellowstone Park will soon have a new and more direct and picturesque line of approach to this wonderland. Work was begun some time ago on an extension of the Oregon Short Line from St. Anthony, Idaho, to the Madison river entrance at the south-west corner of the park.

It is now more than half completed and the Harriman engineers constructing the line say that track will be laid this year on the portion remaining to be built. There is a gap of only about 15 miles between the finished portion of the Yellowstone Park railroad, as the new line is to be called, and its terminus at the Madison river point of entry.

Scenically the new railway route through the Colorado Rockies will be very attractive. The continental divide through Red's pass is crossed at an elevation of 7000 feet, and for a long stretch in the Warm River canyon, about 25 miles from St. Anthony, the engineers were faced by one of the heaviest pieces of railway construction undertaken in the west since the lines were built.

Tourist traffic will form the larger part of the business of the road. Between St. Anthony and Maryville the line passes through a rich agricultural district. Northeastward from Maryville it traverses, for the most part, forest reserve land of great natural beauty and a favorite hunting ground.

To build this 70 miles of road will cost about \$1,500,000. Mr. Harriman, it is said, planned it after a trip with one of the oldest Yellowstone guides who pointed out the advantages of a southern railroad entrance to the park. The Short Line's present route ends at Monida, from which it is a day's stage ride to the park.

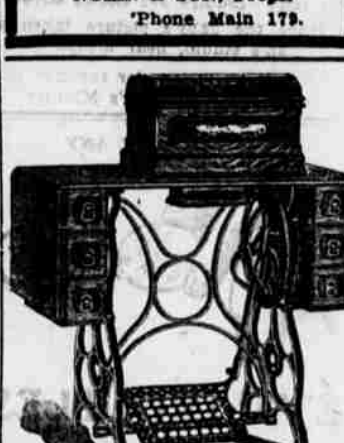
