Ten Arrests on One Charge.

Through the arrest early yesterday morning of 10 people, Sheriff John Edwards believes he has secured the gang responsible for the robberies that have occurred here during the past winter, and whose operations during the past five or six months have aggregated at least \$10,000. The city, the farmers and Northern Pacific are believed to be the principal sufferers from their depredations.

Those arrested are: Mrs. Jane McGinnis, aged 65, her two daughters, Mrs. Mary Parker and Miss Lulu May McGinnis; her two sons, Walter D. McGinnis and Wiley or "Slim" McGinnis; her son-in-law, James Parker; and four friends of the family, J. E. Darnell, Rex Jarrett, Jack Burnett and Andrew Smith.

The McGinnises are well known here, and have been under suspicion, though not under arrest for any serious crimes before.

Numerous robberies, involving all sorts of booty, have been committed for months past to the utter confusion of the authorities. Box cars have been entered and their contents seized. While the evidence against the gang covers operations only since last fall, the authorities believe that its activities extended over several years.

The prisoners have secured H. J. Suively to defend them, and their trial, involving many witnesses and the introduction of much startling evidence, will be among the most sensational held in the county.—Yakima Republic.

Deer Law Void in Union County.

There is a rumor current in La Grande and Union county in fact, to the effect that through an error and oversight on the part of the last legislature, all game laws of Union county are null and void. To save annoyance and trouble from a game warden, local sports had best take careful notice that this mistake occurred only on the laws regulating the killing of deer. The old deer law has expired and in new legislation, the bill was tabled and entirely forgotten, consequently there is no law to punish those shooting deer out of the regular season. This is only true of a few counties, however. Many are of the impression that this condition prevails in all game.

Regardless of the fact that the laws governing the killing of deer are null and void, Union county sportsmen should not take advantage of it and cause a wholesale slaughter of the animal. This condition will exist for two years, and if the hunters would, they could annihilate the animal in that time.

County Clerk Gilham has issued 75 hunters' licenses this year, and as the hunting season is far from open, this figure demonstrates that Union county has a full quota of sportsmen.—La Grande Observer.

Five Horses Cut Up on Barbed Wire.

Yesterday C. E. Nash, of Oregon City, who has been up to Fossil buying horses, brought a band of 19 head into The Dalles. Three of them were, however, in bad condition, requiring the attention of a veterinarian. Mr. Nash explained that in passing the place of Robert Casberg, at Horseshoe Bend, in Sherman county, yesterday about 10:30 five of his horses collided with a loose barbed wire, one of them being so badly injured that he had to shoot and left it on G. F. Guntner's place, and another broke its shoulder. Three others were brought on to town and attended to here. Mr. Nash estimated his damage at \$200 and says if possible he will bring damage against the owner of the fence.—The Dalles Chronicle.

It is said to be too late to do much toward stopping the damage this year, but some organized effort will have to be made to exterminate the pest early next spring, or there will be immense loss.—Nampa Leader.

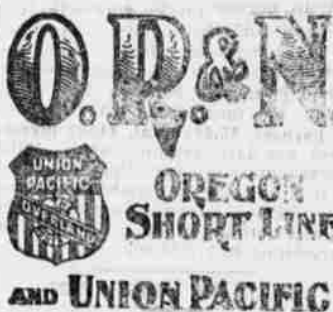
