GENERAL NEWS.

At St. Louis, August Adler, aged 23, fell into the Mississippi. His brother Fred, aged 20, attempted to rescue him and both were drowned.

At Green Lake, near Seattle, Dow Smith, a telegraph lineman, shot and killed his divorced wife and her mother, Mrs. Sarah Gill at the latter's home. Smith was taken in custody.

At Minneapolis, Minn., W. F. Bechtel, former president of the Northwestern Life Insurance company, was today sentenced to state's prison for five years. He was convicted of grand larceny from the company.

The body of Matthias Jackson, a negro charged with criminal assault, was found hanging to a tree about 12 miles from Alexandria, La. He was lynched after being taken from a deputy sheriff, who was taking him to that place for safe keeping.

The health report of Manila shows that no smallpox, cholera or other contagious disease was present during the past semester. This is the first time in the history of the Philippines that a semester has passed in which contagious diseases did not exist.

Daniel F. Raum, once a prominent attorney and social leader of Peoria, Ill., and son of Green B. Raum, ex-commissioner of pensions, was taken to Joliet penitentiary to begin serving an indeterminate sentence, having been convicted of forgery and embezzlement.

Rev. J. A. Pine, for the past few years pastor of the Christian church at Dayton, Wash., has been appointed state evangelist for eastern Washington.

Wages for farm hands, which recently dropped here to \$1.75 and board, have risen again and men employed in the hay fields now earn \$2.25 per day and board. Even at this figure the demand for men can hardly be met by local employment offices.—Yakima Republic.

Six additional clerks, a messenger and assistant porter have been allowed the Portland postoffice. Postmaster Minto received notice from Washington yesterday to this effect, and the new men will begin work July 1, being selected from the applicants on the civil service list.

June 29, late in the afternoon, fire broke out in the Cascade company's lumber and shingle mills at Snohomish, Wash., burning the plant and a large quantity of products. Loss, \$120,000. Had not the wind shifted suddenly at sunset, the entire town of Snohomish would have been destroyed.

Mrs. Elsie Cronin (formerly of Baker City, Oregon), must stand trial for the murder of her husband. Yesterday the grand jury found a true bill against her, charging her with murder in the first degree, and she was remanded to the custody of Sheriff Owens without bail.—Tonopah Daily Herald.

According to the Wall Street Journal the receipts of the Great Northern for June promise to show an increase of 25 per cent over June of last year, aggregating \$58,000,000 or more for the year, and showing a surplus of \$22,000,000 for its stockholders. Why, then, should James J. Hill be so pessimistic?

The movement of sheep to the Bit-

ter Root forest reserve has commenced and fully 70,000 from the Nez Perce, Idaho, Adams, Franklin and Whitman counties will find summer feed in that district. About 50,000 have been moved from the eastern Washington counties during the past few weeks.

W. H. Mock of Bellingham, was chosen department commander of the G. A. R. at its recent session at Seattle, being elected on the first ballot. Other officers elected were: Senior vice commander, K. P. Allen, Pullman; junior vice commander, H. R. Gale, Bremerton; medical director, N. G. Blalock, Walla Walla; chaplain, C. D. Spencer, Centralia.

Bend is to have a trout barbecue on the Fourth again this year. About 2000 fish will be caught for the feast and kept in cold storage until the day of days, when they will be prepared for the table by Chas. Cottor. The law limits the catch to 125 a day for each fisherman, but it is an easy matter to string 10 men along the river at favorite spots for a few days.

Over 1000 Bannock, Shoshone and Snake and Lemhi Indians on the Fort Hall reservation are gathered on the Portneuf river, 12 miles from Pocatello, engaged in their annual war dances. The dances are what are known as half sun dances and last 36 hours, during all of which time the dancers deny themselves food and drink, dancing until exhausted. At another place a big medicine dance is being held.

Two installments of Ellen Terry's autobiography have appeared in McClure's Magazine, and the publishers widely advertised that the series would be continued for several months. The publishers within the past few days have ascertained that it is word for word the same as was

published in 1901 in the New Review, a London monthly, and now advertise that they have rejected all the remaining chapters of the autobiography.

FOURTH OF JULY REST ROOM.

VERY SUCCESSFUL MEETINGS.

Being Held by Rev. Hays at the Presbyterian Mission.

At the evangelical meeting held at the Presbyterian church on the reservation yesterday eight converts were received into the fold. Seven of them were young people, while the eighth was grown and the head of a family. The meetings are being conducted by Rev. James Hays, the noted Indian evangelist, and have been very popular. A service is held every morning and evening, and the series will be brought to a close on Friday morning.

Preparations are now being made for a big church dinner at the mission on July 4, and the occasion will be made a big event.

What an Idaho Man Saw.

George F. Kimery, crier of the supreme court, has returned from a vacation trip to points west, says the Boise Capital News. He visited Portland, Vancouver, Astoria, North Beach and Pendleton, remaining some time in the latter place visiting his sons. Mr. Kimery stated that the wheat crop in the Pendleton and Walla Walla district this year is the best that country has ever known. He said he had made a trip to that section every season for five years, and never before had he witnessed such a sight as is presented now by immense wheat fields, the grain being as high as a man's shoulders. It is estimated, he said, that the crop will run from 35 to 50 bushels to the acre.

Coy. S. F. Blythe, for 40 years a resident of Hood River, has been elected department commander. He saw four years of actual service in the civil war, three years as a member of the 22d Ohio Infantry.

SHOW GOOD MARKSMANSHIP.

Company L Men Make Creditable Records at First Practice.

At the first target practice held by Company L yesterday forenoon some very good records were made by the men, considering their brief experience with the guns. Two series of three rounds each were shot, one standing and the other at a kneel, both being at 200 yards.

For the highest total score Private Blanchett and Sergeant Bailey tied for first place, both making 20 out of a possible 30. For second place Privates Cargill and Hulbert tied, both having 19 points, while Private L. M. Lyman and Sergeant Drake tied for third place, with 18 points each. In the standing shoot, Cargill, Lyman and Drake tied for first place, with 11 points each out of a possible 15. Sergeant Vinler won in the shoot at a kneel by scoring 11 points.

The range used yesterday is located just below the Peter West place on Tutuilla, and after the company's return from encampment a permanent target will be set up and target practice will be held regularly by the company.
