Serious Affray Near Joseph. Tom Tucker and a fellow named Bogan, are wanted in Walla Walla county for assault on the person of one William Estes of Joseph. About a week ago a fight ensued at a dance near Joseph, in which Tom Tucker and Bogan were two of the principals. The next morning the two men went to a sheep shearing camp about seven miles northwest of Joseph, and there saw a relative of the man whom they had been fighting the night previous. Without any reasons, and apparently with intent to kill, Tucker bounced upon Estes and soon had him down on the ground. While sitting on his antagonist, Tucker commenced to beat Estes about the head with the butt of a revolver. The father of Estes rushed to the rescue of his son, and in the secondary scuffle which followed, the revolver was either accidentally discharged or purposely so, and the bullet entered the right hip of Estes, tearing a frightful wound in the thigh. A brother of Tucker has been arrested, charged as an accessory in the assault, but the authorities are unable to lay hands on either Tom Tucker or his pal, Bogan. The wounds sustained about the head are proving as dangerous as the gunshot wound, and Estes is in a critical condition.—La Grande Observer.

Barton Retires From Sumpter Valley. Elsewhere in this issue is a statement of a recent purchase by Joseph Barton, superintendent of the Sumpter Valley railway. Now the information is at hand that Mr. Barton has tendered his resignation with the railroad concern and that the same is effective on next Monday. That there has been some kind of a move in the Sumpter Valley affairs leading up to this has been patent to quite a number of people for some time. Mr. Barton was here on Thursday, but said nothing of the matter and it had not leaked out so that the Baker papers had cognizance of it up to yesterday. There are several rumors afloat here as to who will be put in charge. One has Grant Geddes at the helm and the other names Joseph A. West. President Eccles is now in Baker and at last accounts seemed to be bossing the job himself, which is pretty much his way when he is present and asking questions as to what he calculated doing would be about as satisfactory as Atlas' task in handling this mundane sphere.—Blue Mountain American.

Bend Townsite Sold.

The Bend townsite, together with all other holdings in this section of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Drake and the Pilot Butte Development company, has been sold to a syndicate composed of F. S. Stanley, E. A. Baldwin,

Jesse I. Stearns of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power company, and John Steidl and J. E. Sawhill of Bend. The news was given to the public at 11 o'clock today at a mass meeting called in the B. M. hall, when Mr. Sawhill stated the above facts. He announced further that the D. I. & P. company will move its headquarters back to Bend in the immediate future, and will do all it can to help in the growth of Bend.

The above news was received gladly by the assembled citizens. It assures that the unfortunate troubles which have existed between the Deschutes Irrigation & Power company and the Pilot Butte Development company for the past two years will now be a thing of the past and that the development of this region will go forward without the retarding friction that has heretofore existed.—Bend Bulletin.

Scab in Adams and Franklin.

All of the sheep now being driven to the Bitter Root forest reserve for summer range from central Idaho and eastern Washington are being admitted without the dipping with the exception of Adams and Franklin counties, where large numbers have been dipped during the past few weeks.

Dr. C. L. Henderson, stock inspector for eastern Washington and central Idaho, has recently returned from a trip of inspection to Adams and Franklin counties and directed the dipping of 20,000 sheep while there. Dr. Henderson states that large numbers were dipped by parties from Walla Walla and Pendleton and it is believed the scab will be entirely eradicated from those counties within a few years.

The scab has been eliminated from Nez Perce and Idaho counties and a number of eastern Washington counties and in these counties which have been declared free from scab, the owners of sheep are admitted to the forest range with their bands without dipping.—Lewiston Teller.

Withdraw Bankruptcy Proceedings.

The Oregon Construction company of New York, which was organized in New York to build the Oregon Central railway from Union to La Grande via Cove, and which went into bankruptcy last February, has settled up its affairs in New York and the bankruptcy proceedings withdrawn.

All its attachments have been raised and the company stands free of debt. It will not, however, complete the work it started in Union county, but that will be done by the Oregon Central Railway company. A. B. Brown, general superintendent and chief engineer for the Ore-

gon Central, returned to Union today from a three months' business visit in Boston, where the financial head of the company is located. He will take up the work of continuing the road to La Grande at once.—La Grande Observer.

Sunday Law in Supreme Court.

At 10 o'clock on the morning of July 5, Jerome F. Jacobs, a saloon-keeper of Wallace, in the county of Shoshone, will be brought before the supreme court in response to a writ of habeas corpus issued by the court in special session yesterday, which commands the sheriff of Shoshone county to appear with Jacobs so that the court may determine whether or not he is being unlawfully imprisoned in the county jail of Shoshone county for violation of the Sunday rest law enacted by the last Idaho legislature.

This case will bring the validity of the Sunday rest law before the supreme court at an earlier date than the Dolan case, which is now pending before the district court of Ada county, as it is on the grounds of the unconstitutionality of the act that Jacobs petitions the supreme court for a hearing.

The petition for habeas corpus recites that Jacobs was convicted in the probate court of Shoshone county of violating the provisions of the Sunday rest law by keeping his saloon open on Sunday, June 23, at Wallace. In his petition Jacobs, by his attorneys, represents that the Sunday rest law is unconstitutional and void for the reason that it conflicts with the provisions of section 16 of article 3 of the state constitution, in that the title of said act is misleading, ambiguous and uncertain.

The petitioner further represents that the reason why the application was made to the supreme court is because the question of the constitutionality of the act is involved in the application, and because W. W. Woods, judge of the first judicial district, is now absent from Shoshone county.

The petition calls attention to the recent decision of Judge Fremont Wood in regard to the demurrer in the Dolan case, now pending in his court, in which he expressed his doubt of the constitutionality of the law.—Boise Statesman.
