# CELEBRATION DATA

EVERY FEATURE ANNOUNCED CARRIED OUT AS PLANNED.

Parade Will Form at 10 O'Clock—Indians Will Take Part, Both in the Parade and in the Exercises—War Dance Immediately Following the Parade—Races Early in the Afternoon—Baseball at 3 O'Clock—Band Concert, Broncho Riding and Dance.

With the "booming of guns at sunrise" the glorious Fourth will be ushered in here tomorrow, and from day-break on until midnight there will be something doing most of the time. It is announced today by those in charge of the celebration that the program will be carried out, practically as planned, changes being made only where necessity requires.

Just what attitude Jupiter Pluvius will take towards the celebration is a matter that has not yet been ascertained. "Thursday showers and thunderstorms" is the dampening prophecy flashed out by the weather bureau this morning, and if the prognostications are correct umbrellas rather than parasols, will be in demand tomorrow. However, it is the hope that the rain, should it come, will not be in such quantities as to mar the pleasure of the day. At least the weather will be cool, and should it rain tonight the street sprinklers will not have to make the special run planned.

march, as previously announced, will be down Main to Water, east on Water to Vincent, south on Vincent to Court, west on Court to Main and south on Main to the fair pavilion. This evening the committee will hold a meeting for the purpose of perfecting the last details pertaining to the turnout and to ascertain just what the parade will consist of.

Grand Marshal Tom Gurdane has selected the following aides: Dr. Lloyd Ideman, Berkeley Halley and Roy Alexander.

It is said that the Indians will be in the parade without fail, and this will be one of the spectacular features of the pavilion. Immediately after the parade, instead of following the pavilion program, the Indians will give their war dance. The reason for this is that the Indians cannot be persuaded to wait until after the speaking.

In the afternoon the athletic contest will be pulled off first. The variety races for young men will be run on East Court street, while the girls' race, fat men's race and some other stunts will be held on Main street.

Ball Game at 3. At 3 o'clock the big ball game between the Pendleton nine and the one from Fort Walla Walla will be called at the Matlock grounds. Last Sunday the fort team defeated the Walla Walla nine and a close, interesting contest is expected here tomorrow. Kehm and Collins will constitute the Pendleton battery.

Immediately after the ball game the broncho riding tournament will be held at the ball grounds and will be free to everybody.

At 7:15 in the evening the U. S. Cavalry band will give a concert at the court house grounds, and at 8:30 there will be an illuminated parade. There will be an illuminated parade. From 9 o'clock on there will be dancing in the Armory and at the fair pavilion, no charges being made at either place.

### WILL LEAVE SUNDAY NIGHT

Company L, for the Encampment at Seaside.

Company L, of this city, will leave Sunday night on train No. 5 for the encampment at Seaside, instead of on No. 1, as previously supposed. Yesterday instructions were received by Captain Kern to take the company to Portland upon the night train, and a tourist sleeper will be allowed the company. Last night orders were given for the company to form at the Armory at 9 a. m. tomorrow in order to participate in the Fourth of July parade. Also at 3 p. m. Sunday for the purpose of preparing for the departure for Seaside.

From July 27 to 29 inclusive, the annual O. N. G. rifle competition will be held at Roseburg, and while no orders upon the subject have yet been received by the local guardsmen, it is supposed that the company will be allowed to compete. Four men, a substitute and a commissioned officer are allowed from each company in the state. The expenses of the occasion and field pay are allowed those taking part.

### Delegates to Spokane Convention.

Hall, formerly pastor of the First Baptist church in this city, the Misses Fern and Grace Edwards and Miss Ethel Fraker are delegates from the Baptist church in this city to the convention of the Young People's Baptist union which will be held in Spokane this week, and left today for that city. Rev. Hall went from Medford, where he is now living, by way of Portland to Spokane, but will return to Medford by way of this city. Mrs. Hall and children will accompany him to Medford on his return to remain permanently.

### Will Appeal Turner Will Case.

That the Turner will case, recently decided in the circuit court in favor of the contestees, will be appealed to the supreme court, is stated by Will M. Peterson, one of the attorneys for the contestants. The case has already been tried out in both the county and the circuit courts and the fight will now be carried to the supreme tribunal.

The new board is placed close to the ticket window in the passage between the women's and men's waiting rooms and is more convenient for the public than the old boards which have been in use here for many years.

In the circuit court yesterday afternoon the consideration of the Warner will case was postponed indefinitely while waiting for further witnesses for the plaintiff.

### Six Special Police Tomorrow.

To assist him in keeping order during the Fourth, Chief of Police Gurdane has engaged six special deputies to serve for that day. Of these four will be on the day beat tomorrow, while the other two will be on after night with Officers Kearney and Semple. With a force of six men during the day and four at night, the chief believes he will have little difficulty in carrying for all who may become unruly during the celebration.
