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NOT EVEN REMOTE PROSPECT OF WAR

Opinion of a Japanese Journalist, Published Today in the New York World.

VERY SMALL PER CENT

OF JAPANESE EXCITED.

Declares That Only 10,000 Out of 50,000,000 Want War Because of the San Francisco Rumpus—Compares the Friction in Importance With a Gnat Sting on a Human Body—Kojima Matsukata and Admiral Yamamoto Are Now in New York and Frank to Express Views.

New York, July 13.—"That there will never be war between Japan and the United States is as plain an axiom as two and two make four," writes Kojima Matsukata, a Japanese of high rank, editor of the Kobe Shinbun, one of the most influential Japanese newspapers, in an article in the World today. He is here with Admiral Yamamoto.

"There is no war party in Japan," he continues. "There are about 10,000 out of 50,000,000 who are excited, but they want war. They want redress for damages inflicted on their countrymen in San Francisco. The San Francisco trouble is to our mutual national relations as the sting of a gnat on the human body."

Court in Wallawa.

Enterprise, July 12.—The adjourned term of the circuit court is now in session here. The principal business of the court thus far has been the imposing of fines upon parties who have entered pleas of guilty to indictments charging them with gambling, and those who have sold intoxicating liquor contrary to law, or have given it away. The court construes the law to apply to either the selling or giving it away. Two physicians in Wallawa county have been indicted for selling liquor contrary to law, one of whom is being tried at the present time. Nine parties indicted for gambling pleaded guilty in one day and were fined \$50 each.

Farm Hand Inherits Fortune.

Chicago, July 13.—Wheat opened 91 3-8, closed 94; corn opened 43; closed same; oats opened 44 and closed the same.

Stricken Blind on Auto Track.

Chicago, July 13.—Gus Kobba, driving a machine in the 24-hour auto race on the Har-lem track, today suddenly lost his eyesight due to strain and barely missed the fence. He was taken to a hospital. Physicians say he will regain his sight. Kobba's physicians a few days ago predicted this outcome if he undertook to follow the season out.

C. P. C. THE NORTH COAST.

Canadian Pacific Seeking an Outlet to the Sound.

Walla Walla, July 13.—It is claimed by railroad officials in the city today that the North Coast road, now under construction to Walla Walla, is in reality a branch of the Canadian Pacific, official announcement of which will be made within the next few days. This line is being extended into Walla Walla from Wallula, the survey having been made by E. S. Clark of this city.

Speculation has run riot lately as to who was the real owner of the new line, it having been claimed that every large railroad company in the country was behind the movement, but the announcement today comes from a reliable source, and it is thought the C. P. R. is building the line.

This means much to this country, as it brings in competition, such as would not have been the case had any of the home roads owned the new line. It is claimed that the entire railroad industry in the northwest will be revolutionized within the next few years.

FISHING SCHOONER WAS SUNK.

Run Down in a Fog by a White Star Liner.

New York, July 13.—The fishing schooner Nickerson was sunk by the White Star liner Romnic and three of the crew lost in yesterday's fog off Nantucket, south of the shoals lightship.

PETER WEST MAY YET HAVE RIVAL

PORTLAND FIRM FILING DIVORCE ACTIONS HERE.

Certain Amount of Popularity Insured the System of Getting Divorces in Distinct Counties, as it Avoids Publicity, Which in Many Cases is Disagreeable—Hawn vs. Hawn, From Portland.

Is Peter West to have a rival in the divorce business in Umatilla county? This question is now seriously agitating legal circles in this city.

Today Attorneys Grey and Richardson of Portland filed a suit for Mrs. Mary E. Hawn against Lewis O. Hawn, and it is said that a number of divorce cases from Portland are now being prepared by the same attorneys to be heard in Umatilla county.

By securing service in this county Portland divorces and unpleasant family affairs may be kept more secret as there is not the same degree of interest in the cases filed by strangers as would be taken in local cases and for this reason it is believed that a general policy of filing divorce cases in this and other eastern Oregon counties is to be pursued by certain Portland attorneys hereafter.

The Hawns were married in The Dalles in 1902 and have no children. The complaint filed by Mrs. Hawn alleges general misconduct on the part of her husband, who is a cook in a Portland restaurant.

Walla Walla Stork Was Busy.

One hundred and fourteen new residents arriving in the county of Walla Walla during April, May and June, according to the quarterly report of births for the quarter just closed, which was made up yesterday at the auditor's office, says the Walla Walla Union. Of the 114 new babies who appeared on the scene of action, 60 were boys and 54 girls. April leads the list, when 46 births were reported, while in May there were 37 and in June 31.

Crews "Double Out" of Pendleton.

Owing to a recent change in the run of the Pendleton-Portland passenger service on the O. R. & N., the crews on that run now "double out" of this city, which means that they return to Portland on the next train after their arrival here from Portland, giving them but a few hours in this city. Formerly they laid over one train, but now they return immediately to Portland, making a continuous run of 462 miles from Portland to this city and return.

STATE IS OFFERING REBUTTAL TESTIMONY IN HAYWOOD TRIAL

The Main Portion of it Was to Discredit Defense in Relation to Orchard's Movements.

One Witness Swore Orchard Did Not Have Mustaches in November, 1905

—Another Said He Was Not Playing Cards When Mine Was Blown Up—A Railroad Contradicted Elliott About Riding on a Certain Train—A Hotel Clerk Said Orchard Was at Salt Lake When Elliott

Said He Met Him on the Train—Rooming House Man Contradicted

Dr. McGee.

Boise, July 13.—The defense rested immediately upon court reconvening.

The state called as the first witness John Rice of Caldwell, an attorney, who swore Orchard did not have a mustache in November, 1905, when the witness Elliott said he met him on a train.

Dan Garney of Walla Walla, Wash., contradicted Dominick Flynn, who swore Orchard was playing cards the day the Bunker Hill-Sullivan mill was blown up. Garney said Flynn told him at that time he did not know where Orchard had gone.

E. E. Grunshaw of Deadwood, identified John O'Neill, editor of the Miners' Magazine, whom he knew in Dakota in 1890. He was called to testify that O'Neill was tried for murder, but the defense objected and

the court took the matter under advisement.

E. M. Hughes, a railroad manager, contradicted witness Elliott by swearing that Elliott did not have ridden on the train he swore he rode on.

T. C. Callopy, another railroad, gave similar testimony.

J. T. Stevenson, clerk of the Cullen hotel at Salt Lake, swore Orchard was there at the time Elliott said he saw him on a train.

J. H. Moser of Denver, swore Orchard stopped at his rooming house in 1904 from July 29 to August 1. This was during the time Dr. McGee testified he saw him at Wallace, Idaho.

Sheriff Bailey of Shoshone county and other witnesses, have testimony contradicting that of McGee.

COAL BUNKERS AT LA GRANDE.

Will Be Reached by Twelve Hundred Feet of New Track.

New and improved coal chutes are promised the La Grande division, says the La Grande Observer. Contractor Miller and Engineer Newell are today grading for temporary tracks over which dirt cars will be hauled and which will eventually lead part the new coal chutes, or rather coal storage, which the coal supply house will be called from now on.

The longest approach to the round house will leave the main line tracks where Second street intersects with the main line, and strike off in a northwesterly direction until it reaches Fourth street. From that street it goes slightly south and then directly to the new round house. In all, this track is to cover a distance of 2200 feet.

The coal storage is to be built along the south side of this track at the point where it crosses North Fourth street. The tracks attentive to the coal storage will be spurs from this main line sidetrack and will be elevated for a distance of 1200 feet.

To Attend Garfield Banquet.

Judge S. A. Lowell left last night for Portland to attend the banquet to be tendered to Secretary of the Interior James R. Garfield in that city tonight. An effort will be made to have Mr. Garfield come to Hermiton to view the government irrigation project while in the west.

BICKERS WILL AGAIN BE HEAD OF STATE REFORM SCHOOL

The earnest solicitation of Pendleton friends will be successful and H. E. Bickers of the firm of Livermore & Bickers and clerk of Pendleton school district, will be named as superintendent of the Oregon reform school next Monday by Governor Chamberlain.

Mr. Bickers was formerly superintendent of the reform school under Governor Geer and his friends here have urged his appointment by Governor Chamberlain for many months and a dispatch to Mr. Bickers from

Salem last evening says that his appointment will be officially made on next Monday.

While he regrets to leave Pendleton, yet Mr. Bickers said to the East Oregonian today that he would probably take the position. He is especially fitted for the work and while superintendent of the reform school before made an enviable record as manager of unruly boys. WIFE CAUSED HIS DISMISSAL.

Wife of C. G. Ayers of 14th Cavalry Talked Too Much.

Walla Walla July 13.—By direction of the president, Lieut. Col. C. G. Ayers, 14th Cavalry, has been ordered before the retiring board which meets at the Army building in New York on July 17. The station of Colonel Ayers is at Fort Walla Walla, but since his assignment to the 14th Cavalry he has been on leave in the east; never having joined the regiment.

The immediate cause for the order which has for its object his retirement, was the publication recently of an interview with Lieut. Colonel Ayers in which he is alleged to have criticized the army methods in discussing the late trouble between his wife and the West Point authorities over the interest taken by Mrs. Ayers in the court martial of a number of cadets who loaned their service overcoats to their lady friends who were caught in a storm while watching a parade at the Point.

Mrs. Ayers simply "talked too much."

MORGAN A WITNESS.

Declares He Never Knew or Saw Woman.

London, July 13.—Pierpont Morgan was a witness in a London court against Mrs. Josephine Leslie, who is accused of alleging friendship with Morgan in order to get money through schemes. Morgan declared he never knew or had seen the woman, Annie Blount, an Irish heiress, charges the defendant with securing \$42,500 from her on Morgan pretenses.

LARGEST SALE OF RANGE HORSES

ONE THOUSAND ANIMALS

AT UMATILLA JULY 22-23.

Expected That a Hundred Buyers Will Attend—The Herd Will Include Many Well-Bred Horses, Including Drivers and Fine Saddlers—Encroachments of Settlers Breaking Up the Great Herds.

What will be the largest sale of range horses ever held in Oregon, will be held at Umatilla on July 22 and 23, when Samis Brothers will offer for sale the bulk of the Switzer horses which are now being gathered from the ranges in Benton, Douglas and Klamath counties, Washington.

One thousand head of horses will be gathered for this sale and it is expected over 100 buyers will be present to attend the sale. Riders are now scouring the ranges used for the past 40 years by the Switzers on the north side of the Columbia river and these wild horses will be rounded up from every part of southern Washington at Umatilla.

This herd of horses will comprise animals of every kind and description and many of them are exceedingly well bred and many fine teams of drivers and fine saddlers are among them as well as many heavy draught horses.

Settlers are crowding into the ranges used for so many years by John and "Jade" Switzer and it is the intention to close out the vast herds which have ranged for 200 miles on the Columbia river from the Rattlesnake hills to The Dalles.

These horses have watered on the Columbia river and one of the most picturesque sights to be witnessed in the northwest in the past has been the galloping herds miles in length going down the dusty trails from the sagebrush plains of Klamath county to drink at their accustomed watering places.

Mrs. Gibson Divorced.

Chicago, July 13.—Mrs. Preston Gibson, niece of the late Marshall Field, was today granted an absolute divorce and the custody of their only child for nine months in each year. Cruelty was the charge brought by Mrs. Gibson.

Neal Durant, an employee of the Ramsey sawmill near Ho, Idaho, slipped while at work and his knee was split open by a buzz saw. He bled to death before a doctor could be summoned, two arteries being severed and the limb horribly mangled.

MAKING READY FOR A STRIKE

Western Union and Postal Are Shipping Strike Breakers to Chicago.

MANY OF THE IMPORTED OPERATORS ARE WOMEN

Telegraphers in New York City are Ready to Walk Out in the Event Commissioner Neill Fails to Effect a Settlement of the Dispute at San Francisco—Said that of 22000 Operators in New York that 1800 Stand Ready to Leave Their Work in Sympathy With Westerners.

San Francisco, July 13.—The telegraphers' conference was without definite results.

Chicago, July 13.—Secretary Russell was notified today that a shipment of strikebreakers has been made from Peterson, N. J. This is accepted as evidence the Western Union and Postal are determined to prepare for a strike.

The strikebreakers are students from the general offices of the company. Some of them are women. The Postal has housed its men in a downtown hotel.

Ready for Strike in New York.

New York, July 13.—Chas. McInery, secretary of the local telegraph operators' union, said today that 90 per cent of the 2000 telegraphers in the city are ready to walk out today if work comes that Commissioner Neill has failed to effect a settlement.

Little Chance of a Settlement.

Oakland, July 13.—Commissioner Neill, General Superintendent Jaynes and Assistant Superintendent Miller, of the Western Union, went into conference at Western Union headquarters here this afternoon. There is apparently little chance of a settlement. President Small has little confidence of the negotiations coming to a happy ending.

Although denied by Konenkamp, the understanding at headquarters is that the feeling is not the best between Committeemen Rely and Sullivan and Small. It is understood eastern men are not anxious for an extension of the strike.

New York Situation Critical.

New York, July 13.—President Ahern, of the local union, announced at 3 o'clock that the local situation is critical, and declared the operators of New York and Chicago are prepared to strike on a moment's notice. Radical action is expected during the next few hours.

MAY SUTTON OWNS THE TROPHY

Has Won Championship at Tennis Three Times.

Newport, Wales, July 13.—May Sutton today defeated Miss Lowther in straight sets 6-0 to 7-5, successfully defending her title to the Welsh tennis championship. This is the third time she has captured the title. She is now absolute owner by triple championship of the trophy presented by the Marquis of Bute.

Killed in Automobile Accident.

Bellingham, Wash., July 13.—Because a clutch failed to work as an auto driven by John Larson, a wealthy man of this city, was turning into a narrow road the machine with the occupants went over an embankment near Samish lake last night. Larson received injuries from which he died this morning. Dr. D. E. Biggs and Glen Hyatt, a miner were injured.
