Echo, July 13.—P. C. Hunter of Ir-rigon, will arrive here in a few days to act as station agent in the place of C. R. Livesay, who expects to leave in a short time for the coast to spend the summer. Mr. Hunter comes highly recommended.

It is reported that the Echo and Hermiston baseball teams will cross bats tomorrow. A good game is expected.

Oliver P. Morton has gone to Bingham Springs on a brief fishing trip.

Farmers are busy in all directions preparing for the grain harvest, and some harvesting is already going on in the barley fields. Some of the farmers will begin on their wheat next week.

A number of Echo people will go to the coast or to the mountain resorts for a few weeks during the summer. Echo has been largely represented at the county seat during the past week.

The Henrietta mills, which are being thoroughly overhauled and repaired, will be in excellent shape to begin grinding on this season's crop of grain.

Those who have been fishing in the Umatilla river of late have brought in some fine looking fish and were well repaid for their time.

All things are going along smoothly in the reclamation project, where the usual force is being employed.

ENGINE COST \$2250

Banister Will Run Two 14-Foot Headers—Fine Furnishings for the United Brethren Church—Winn Was Knocked Senseless—Miss Bulfinch Will Teach in the Normal School—Regent Mair of The Dalles in Town.

Weston, July 13.—Joe H. Key has completed negotiations for a fine traction engine of the J. I. Case pattern to run his threshing outfit this season. It develops 20-horse power, and the boiler is made of very thick material. The engine is built for double duty, and may be used for both plowing and threshing. It cost \$2250, Mr. Key's former engine being taken on the deal at a valuation of \$1000.

Sam Banister will run his headers with the Key outfit this season, as usual. He will put two 14-foot machines in service.

Bays Land.
G. W. Craigen has purchased of W. F. Aherhart 40 acres of pasture and timber land on Reed and Hawley mountain, for a consideration of \$500.

The new church pews have arrived for the United Brethren church at this place. They are modern pews and cost the church about \$700. This is one of the best churches in the city.

Miss Agnes Bulfinch has been engaged as a member of the normal school faculty for next year. Her work will probably be in the intermediate grade. Miss Bulfinch has had excellent training, and the choice is considered a good one.

Raspberries and cherries are being shipped out by the different mountain ranchers. The cherries about here are of excellent size and quality this year, as also are all kinds of berries.

The farmers are all busy for the harvest season which will soon be on. H. J. Mair of The Dalles, one of the new Normal regents, has been here for a few days on business pertaining to the school. He was met at Pendleton by Mrs. R. C. French of the Normal.

TEACHERS VINCENT SCHOOL.

Miss Sanders Will Learn Nursing at Walla Walla.

Milton, July 13.—At a school board meeting recently held in the Vincent district, Kyle McDaniel was chosen as principal, and Miss Faith Kennedy of Milton, and Miss Phillippi of Hudson Bay, assistants for the ensuing term.

Miss Bertie Elam has gone to Seattle, where she will visit for some time.

Miss Myrtle Sanders of Hudson Bay, has entered the Walla Walla hospital to take training for a nurse.

Rev. Child, who resides at Meridian, Idaho, while engaged in despoiling his cellar yesterday, noticed evidence of an old creek bed. Clarkston, Idaho, will soon make her first bond issue, as \$4000 will be raised by the sale of bonds which were ordered sold by the city council at its last meeting. The life of the bonds will not exceed 10 years, and the interest will be below 6 per cent. Clarkston has always been on a cash basis, and as this is the first bond issue they will be in demand.

GARFIELD CITES
THE PRESIDENT

A HIGH STANDARD OF
CITIZENSHIP IS URGED.

Secretary of the Interior Says the "Stay at Home" Is a Poor Citizen—If Politics Are Impure It Is the Duty of Good Citizens to Clarify Them—Take an Interest in Government.

The Seattle News gives the following resume of Secretary Garfield's address in that city on political issues:

Secretary Garfield addressed the club very briefly pointing out the duty of the citizen in politics, says the News. He roundly scored the man who fails to turn out and cast his ballot either at a primary or a general election.

"What we need in politics," said Mr. Garfield, "is the man who will lend dignity and honesty to public affairs. The man who cries that politics is too dirty for him is not the citizen who will benefit his community. If politics is dirty it should be the duty of every good citizen to lend his aid in cleansing political affairs. It is this that has made President Roosevelt the great man he is today.

"In his every move in public life President Roosevelt has worked for cleaner politics and you men must remember that the only way to keep politics clean is for you to pay the same attention to public affairs you do to your own business."

CATHOLIC SOCIETIES.

Sixth Annual Convention of Federation.

Indianapolis, Ind., July 13.—Distinguished clergy and laymen of the Roman Catholic church in America are arriving in Indianapolis to take part in the sixth national convention of the American Federation of Catholic societies. The convention will be formally opened tomorrow with pontifical high mass at St. Peter and Paul's Cathedral and a sermon by Archbishop Blenk of New Orleans. The business sessions will begin in Tomlinson hall Monday and continue for three days.

Among the organizations belonging to the federation, all of which will be represented at the convention, are the Western Catholic union, the Ancient Order of Hibernians, the Catholic Order of Foresters, the German Central Verein, the Catholic Knights of America, the Knights of St. John, the Catholic Mutual Benefit association, the Irish Catholic Benevolent union, and the Catholic Knights and ladies of America. Ten thousand Catholic Indians, as well as the Porto Rico and Hawaii federations, will also be represented at the convention.

Among the eminent prelates who will address the convention are Archbishop Messmer of Milwaukee, Bishop McFaul of Trenton, and Rt. Rev. Mgr. Joseph Schrembs of Grand Rapids.
