Money in Strawberries.

Wm. Lewis purchased a place of 70 acres from R. M. Breeze between this city and Dixie several years ago at \$75 per acre. This was thought to be a very high price for land at that time, but results have proven that Mr. Lewis knew what he was doing. This place has been devoted largely to orchard and garden and is proving a money-maker without irrigation. Mr. Lewis has in something less than two acres in strawberries and while the late frost cut down the yield so much that at one time he was tempted to plow up the entire patch, he has sold to date \$625 worth of strawberries from this patch. These berries are raised without a drop of irrigation water and are therefore much better than any irrigated product and command a correspondingly higher price. Mr. Lewis will set out several acres more of strawberries this fall.

W. E. Abbey, who owns a fine place in the same neighborhood which he is gradually getting into the highest state of cultivation, has an excellent orchard just coming into bearing and will have a lot of fruit to sell this year. He only has about one-fourth acre of strawberries this year, but has already sold over \$125 worth aside from what he has used himself.—Waitsburg Times.

Killed Team, Driver Escaped.

Some belated news concerning the havoc wrought by the recent wind and hail storm in the Silikapoo section has just been furnished by John Scully, postmaster at Silikapoo. Mr. Scully states that much damage was done to crops in the vicinity of Sweetwater, where some of the farmers had their crops totally destroyed. Among those who suffered heavy loss, he states, is Clarence Selvidge, an extensive farmer residing about two and a half miles southeast of Silikapoo.

Besides sustaining other losses from the effects of the storm, Mr. Selvidge had one badly injured. He was returning home from a trip to Silikapoo and had arrived at his gate but a short distance from the house when the storm broke. Near the gate were a number of large pine trees and just as he picked up the lines and started

to drive the team through there came a violent gust of wind and nearly every tree within a short distance of him was blown down. One fell across the team, killing one of the horses instantly and so badly injuring the other that it will be incapacitated for work for some time. The buggy was also slightly damaged by the limbs on the falling tree. Mr. Selvidge was walking along side the buggy driving the team and fortunately escaped without injury.—Lewiston Tribune.

School Teacher Killed Himself.

J. W. Gibson, a school teacher, whose parents live on a farm just west of this city, committed suicide near Pocatello yesterday by shooting himself in the left breast with a revolver. He is supposed to have been temporarily insane. The remains will be brought up from Pocatello on this morning's train and will be taken in charge by Dinwoody's who will conduct the funeral. The act of self-destruction was accomplished while Gibson was on the railroad tracks near Tyhee station. The train crew on No. 9, northbound, yesterday morning saw the man fire the shot, and they notified the chief dispatcher from Ross Fork, who notified the coroner. When Coroner Howard of Pocatello, arrived on the scene he found the body lying face downward alongside the track about a mile north of Tyhee siding. The remains were taken to Pocatello, after the coroner decided that an inquest would not be necessary.—Idaho Falls Post.

Septic Tanks for Ritzville.

Two Spokane men submitted bids for the proposed new sewer system and septic tank for the city. They were opened by the city council, but will not be awarded for some time, probably two weeks. The bidders were Mr. Blake, whose figure was \$20,700, and John Price, who offered to do the work for \$18,000. These bids were filed. It is assumed that the contract will be awarded to the lowest bidder.

It is said by the city officials that the bids are under the figure which it had been expected would be asked for the work. Ritzville has long needed this system, and work will be well

comed. The question has been agitated for some time, and systems in different towns in this vicinity have been examined, with a view of obtaining the best system possible for the needs of this town.—Ritzville Times.

Two Men Drowned.

An accident occurred this afternoon in the Kootenai river, when two men were drowned. The river foreman and his gang of six men were working about a mile up the river and were climbing into their boat when it capsized with five men in it, throwing them into the swift current.

One of them, Earl Gibbons, was unable to swim, and sank immediately. Another, Higgins, swam about 400 yards and all his companions shouted to him to swim to the logs, which were passing in large numbers. Their cries were apparently unheeded, and he sank unheeded. It is supposed, by the cold waters. The other three managed to swim to the boom and were rescued by a party in a canoe.—Wardner News.

PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

Enormous Output of Magazines, Books and Newspapers Today

The enormous output of printed matter, newspapers, magazines and books, is presented in an article by Henry Turner Bailey in the May number of the Printing Art in a way to arrest the attention of the most indifferent reader. Much as we dislike the use of mere figures, says the Bangor (Me.) Commercial, the subject is one of so much interest that we cannot do better than refer to some of Mr. Bailey's statistics.

In 1906 the printing presses of the country turned out in newspapers and magazines a total of 75,080,000,000 copies—230,000,000 a day, almost 10,000,000 per hour, or 160,000 per minute, or 2600 per second every second of the time for the year. They produced besides 15,000 new books, averaging 150 pages each, in editions averaging 2000 copies, a total of 4,500,000,000 pages of reading matter, enough to give four books of 150 pages each to every man, woman and child in the United States.

Besides all this, these presses turned out different classes of job printing by the cubic mile, the estimated value of the total output of the printers of the country being the rounders of the country by a round \$500,000,000. There are but five other industries in the United States yielding a larger product than that of the printing press.
