Now You See It and Now You Don't. The county commissioners this morning rejected three applications for licenses at Wapato after very brief consideration, but later decided to reopen the matter on the advice of the prosecuting attorney that even if Wapato is incorporated within a short time the county still would have the right to the whole amount of the license fee.

The applicants were J. D. Morrison, H. A. Frank and Charles Bruenn. Attorney W. M. Thompson, who represented Morrison, told the board that his client owned the Cottage hotel and that he was under a very serious disadvantage in competition with the Wapato hotel, which recently received a license for a bar. Mr. Thompson produced a petition from a number of residents of the town in favor of the license and also the sum of \$500 in \$20 gold pieces, together with a certified check for \$500, to pay the license fee, and planted these inducements before the board.

After some consideration this afternoon the commissioners decided to grant all three applications and Wapato accordingly will have four saloons, yielding a revenue of \$4000 to the county. It is likely that part of this revenue will be utilized to provide police protection in the town, a provision the residents are most anxious to have.

Late this afternoon the commissioners reconsidered their vote on the Wapato petitions and decided to turn down all three applications. This action was taken when it became known that one of the applicants, Bruenn, did not want license if more than one was to be granted. The commissioners expressed their belief that inasmuch as the people had signed three petitions it would be unfair to grant any one without the others. This was the third vote taken on the Wapato applications, the commissioners turning all three down this morning, then granting them, and late this afternoon again refusing them.—Yakima Republic.

Off Year for Apples.

"An off year for apples," is the report that comes from fruit districts all around and according to Fruit Commissioner Weber may be said to be the condition in the vicinity of The Dalles, which, although it does not make a specialty of apples, yet has many fine apple orchards.

At Hood River it is said that while the quality of the apple will probably be the average, the yield will be 60 per cent and at Mosier will be materially full yield.

Hood River should send out 300 cars but it is not believed there will be more than 175 to 190 cars or at most 114,000 boxes. They are, however, expecting especially high prices as will be the case in all districts where the best varieties are grown.

From Mr. F. O. Brace, whose orchard is five miles up Mill creek, and from whom Davidson Bros., of Hood River secured 200 boxes of extra fine Spitzbergers and Newtowns last year, it is learned that a representative of that company has recently visited him and is extremely desirous of again purchasing his fruit. Last year Mr. Brace received \$2 a box; this year they have made him an offer of \$2.25 for every box containing 125 apples or under and a good price for the remainder. There is an advantage in disposing of them to this company as the fruit is off hands in a week's time, while, though he might secure a higher price by selling them in smaller lots, there is the disadvantage of handling them. Mr. Brace expects to have something like 1500 boxes this year.

J. C. Hostettler, who has 40 acres on his Chenoweth Cove farm planted to apples, will have at least 3000 boxes of the Spitzbergers and improved Ben Davis varieties and may have double the amount if the winds do not play havoc with his orchard. It was feared that the hot weather of last week would damage the fruit, but such was not the case. The dry season last year, he says, is responsible for the decrease in the yield this year, as apples put forth their spurs a season in advance.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Burned to Death in Cookhouse.

Hubert Scott Edwards, the 14-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Edwards of Mayville, was fatally burned last Saturday afternoon in the cookhouse of Mr. Edwards' threshing machine. Mr. Edwards had been working short-handed and his wife had been cooking for the crew. About 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon she took the baby and went out to ride in the headerbox with Mr. Edwards and after going a round or two the baby fell asleep and she then took it to the cookhouse and laid it on the opposite end from the stove. Then, as it was almost supper time, she started a fire and went out to the threshing machine which was only a short distance from the cookhouse. It seems that the heading crew, although it was further away from the cookhouse than the threshing machine, was the first to discover the fire and immediately called attention to it, but by the time Mrs. Edwards

got to the house the bedding with which she had covered the baby and the clothes which were on him were completely burned. A doctor was immediately summoned from Fossil, seven miles away, but could do nothing except to alleviate the pain of the little sufferer and he passed away at 9 o'clock Saturday evening. It is not known what started the fire, but, as the cookhouse was not damaged at all, it is supposed that it was caused by a spark from the stove which alighted upon the bedding and ignited it.—Cotton Globe.

Killed by Train Near Gooding. Word was brought to Shoshone this morning that the body of a man about 40 years of age had been found on the railroad tracks near Gooding and a request that the coroner be called.

The inquest revealed that the dead man's name was Pavel Salajka, an Austrian. He carried in his pockets his first naturalization papers which had been issued at Omaha. He also had a letter dated June 8, from J. Peterynos, 1416 Kentucky street, San Francisco. The body was dressed in clean, neat working clothes. Some 500 or 600 yards from the body and along the track was found a roll of bedding supposed to belong to the dead man. The roll contained besides good bedding, comb, towels, tooth brush and other toilet articles, indicating the owner to have been a man of cleanly habits.

It is the opinion of the authorities who examined the body that the man was killed on the train and his body thrown off in being thrown from it. There was no money, not even a pocketbook, on the body.—Shoshone Herald.

G. J. Smith of Coffeyville, Kan., a new arrival in Pocatello, was yesterday found to be suffering from a light attack of smallpox, and was taken by Quarantine Officer A. H. Smith to the city barn on the banks of the purring Portneuf at the foot of Johnson street. Street Overseer O'Keefe whose teams occupy the barn in question, vigorously objected to the transformation of his stable into a pest house and sought the advice of the mayor, who conferred with County Coroner Howard and endeavored to impress that officer with the belief that the case should be cared for by the county. It is understood that Dr. Howard will this afternoon

take charge of the sick man, although where he will be kept has not yet been determined. Residents in the vicinity of the city barn object strenuously to the presence of the sick man in that vicinity. However, the county has no pest house, and the sequestration of Mr. Smith will in all probability be continued at the old stand.—Pocatello Tribune.

He had met with no accident whatever and could not imagine how such a report had gained circulation. Mr. Taggart made inquiries concerning Johnson, the sender of the telegram, but could not be found. Mr. Taggart returned to Baker City yesterday happy in the thought that his brother was alive but a little bit pestered that he should be the victim of such a canard and at an expense of \$50 or more.—Baker City Democrat.
