AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

89500 Sheep Bring \$36,475. The largest sheep deal made in this county in some time was that made a few days ago by J. C. Lloyd and Robt. Hamilton whereby the former sold to the latter 6000 head of lambs at \$3.60 per head and 3500 head of yearlings at \$4.25 per head, to be delivered in the early part of September at Mr. Lloyd's corrals on the Menashaah. This makes a total of \$36,475. Mr. Lloyd's lambs and yearlings have heretofore for many years been shipped to Chicago about this time of year, but this season, owing to the excellent prices offered at home he decided to sell at home and avoid the risks attendant on selling at so great a distance at a time when railroad transportation is so uncertain and unsatisfactory.
It is understood that Mr. Hamilton has brought these lambs and yearlings to carry over the coming winter as a speculation. They will shear a good clip of wool and presumably bring a high price as yearlings and two-year-olds in the same market at that season when Washington turns out the earliest fat mutton.—Ellensburg (Wash.) Capital.
Abundant Fruit in Nez Perce. "There is an abundant fruit crop in the Nez Perce prairie country this year," said Deputy Fruit Inspector Mohl this morning. "Some of the trees are breaking down with their loads. The season is later in that section and the frosts that caught the Lewiston valley did not effect the higher country.
"There have been an abundance of peaches of the earlier varieties, and summer apples have been plentiful. It will be about two or three weeks yet before the later peaches are ripe. With but few exceptions the orchards of the prairie are set mostly to summer and fall apples. There are few commercial orchards in bearing at this time."
Mr. Mohl himself, has an orchard of 40 acres, set principally to winter apples, and will this season harvest his first considerable crop. He has 1800 apple trees and has been experimenting this year with the dry spray to keep down the codlin moth. He has sprayed three times and reports that he has less than 1 per cent of wormy apples.
"Vt will have 600 boxes of Rome Beauties," said Mr. Mohl, "and about as many of Jonathans, and a mixed lot of as many more. My orchard is coming into bearing rapidly now and I will have to devote all of my time to the work of cultivation and the matter of guarding against the fruit pests. From the success of this year it cannot longer be doubted that orchards in the upper country will be a financial success."—Lewiston Teller.
Lunatic Assails Threshers. A telephone message from Eagle today was to the effect that considerable annoyance has been experienced by farmers in that vicinity on account of a stranger skulking around the houses and frightening the occupants. The man who, apparently is demented, appeared this morning near the farm of Bumgartner where men were engaged in the harvest field and began throwing stones at the threshing machine and men operating it until they were compelled to knock off work and chase after their tormentor, who fled to the hills, tearing off his clothes as he ran. After a short chase the men returned to their work and have not been molested since that as the crazy man was evidently too frightened to return and renew his actions.—Boise Capital News.
Protest Rates on Fruit. The express cost of sending fruit to the Twin Cities is the cause of a complaint made by the Thompson Fruit company to the state railroad commission. They have also filed with the express people a protest and are awaiting an explanation. The complaint of the company in concrete form is that the charges on a certain fruit shipment are \$120 in excess of what they should be according to the tariff schedule. Under the schedule the rate is \$2 per hundred and the weight is fixed at 20 pounds per box for prunes and 40 pounds per box for pears. It is not claimed that the rates have been changed, but that there must have been some increase in the box weight figuring. F. E. Thompson says that as he shipped
