Ten Years in Pen.

A special from Grangeville, Idaho, says: Ten years in the state penitentiary is the punishment imposed on Thomas Eagan for the attempted murder of Hilda Carlson and her small brother, Judge Steel pronouncing sentence today. It is possible that Eagan will appeal to the supreme court, but this is not certain.

Eagan is a middle aged railroad contractor, and for more than a year he had been courting pretty Hilda Carlson, who lives on a farm near Cottonwood. She flitted him for a younger man, which so angered Eagan that he became slightly intoxicated and rode out to the girl's home and began firing at her. Three bullets struck her, one in the back of the head, which made an ugly wound. Hilda's three-year-old brother, who was lying on a couch, was shot through the groin, sustaining a wound which will leave its mark for life. Both Hilda and her brother recovered and testified against Eagan, who pleaded emotional insanity.

Hogs to Market.

John Shaw, the valley farmer, brought to the Grande Ronde meat company a wagon load of hogs which weighed 1650 pounds and brought \$107.25. There were but five hogs in the lot, three of them weighing 950 pounds and the other two weighing 350 each. The price received was 6 1/2 cents per pound.

While this is not an extraordinary weight for hogs, these were very young ones and their rapid accumulation in size is attributed to the fact that they were fed on black barley, which is regarded as a close substitute for corn for hog feed. Up to the present year this kind of barley was grown only by Mr. Shaw and one or two other farmers of this valley. This year black barley is being much more extensively produced, many other farmers having seen patches exclusively for hog feed.—La Grande Morning Star.

Big Drive of Railroad Ties.

Lum Allen, who had charge of the big drive of ties for the Boise Valley Construction company, arrived down with 7600 ties Tuesday evening and they were put in the boom near the Oregon Short Line railroad bridge, where a force of men are loading them on the Boise Valley cars. The ties were cut on Rattlesnake and started down the river August 31. They have about 1800 left that will be started down the river the coming week. The drive was very successful. They experienced no difficulty in making the trip down the river until they

reached the big pond at the Barber Lumber company's mill, where the ties spread out all over the pond and some time was spent in gathering them up and putting them over the dam. Eight men were employed in the drive. Mr. Allen says considerable work is being done at the Highland power plant, and about 40 men are employed in construction work. At the government dam they have only an opening of 25 feet to build before the dam is across the river.—Boise Capital News.

A Cove Farm Sold.

Vivian Kennedy and son, James F., of Cove, were in the county seat yesterday arranging the terms of transfer of their farm in Lower Cove to William Doyle, lately from Nebraska. The farm consists of 300 acres, mostly farm land, and well improved. The price paid is \$50 per acre. Some farm stock and 1000 bushels of oats was also sold. Mr. Doyle has large holdings of land and stock in Wyoming and Nebraska.—La Grande Observer.

Why Dan Kelly Lost Out.

Dan Kelly, the Baker City foot-racer, who met defeat at Jamestown, writes to friends the cause of his defeat was that he went south too soon and was weakened by the climate before the big event took place. The other contestants only arrived in the city the day before the meet and the climate did not have a chance to get to them. He is confident that he would have had a walk-over had he been in condition.—Baker City Democrat.

Wolves Kill Deer.

Deer hunting in Douglas county, which was so good during the season of 1906, seems to be very poor from the reports of the first month and a half's hunt. Where there were scores of deer last year there are now hardly any. The cause seems to be due to the depredations of wolves, which for several years have been increasing rapidly despite the bounty of \$7.50 per scalp offered by this county. Last winter the snow in the mountains was very deep and this spring the canyons of the Cascade range and spurs are dotted with the bleaching skeletons of hundreds of deer. The wolves hunt their prey all times of year but are worse in winter when other food is scarce and the deer badly hampered in flight.
