STATE TREASURER

Big Bond Is Filed Representing \$635,000 with the Governor, of Which \$25,000 is Guaranteed by Pendletonians - Almost Every County in State Is Represented-J. P. Rogers of Salem, Is Heaviest Security - Governor Chamberlain Not Fully Satisfied.

Four Pendleton citizens have signed the new bonds of State Treasurer Steele to the amount of \$25,000, the individual bonds secured in this city being as follows: Colonel James H. Raley, \$10,000; W. J. Furnish, \$5000; Montie B. Gwinn, \$5000, and E. L. Smith, \$5000.

The total bonds submitted by Steele to the governor on Saturday morning amounted to \$635,000, and the matter of investigating the personal responsibility of the individual bondsmen is now in progress. Almost every county in the state is State Treasurer represented on Steele's new bond, Marion county being the heaviest security, that county alone furnishing \$157,500 of the new bond. J. P. Rodgers of Salem, is the heaviest individual bondsman, he having signed for \$50,000. W. I. Vawter of Jackson, was next highest with

Governor Chamberlain yesterday began an investigation of the qualifications of the 92 sureties who furnished the new bond of \$600,000 for State Treasurer Steel. This investigation will require several days, and in making it the governor will be assisted probably by some mercantile agency. If the sufficiency of the bond is questioned by the governor, Mr. Steel will be given additional time to get other sureties.

Although only \$600,000 bonds were required, Mr. Steel has filed sureties for a total of \$635,000, and, has announced that he is in a position to furnish bonds to the omount of \$95,-000 if necessary.

"I have been inquiring into the

sufficiency of the treasurer's new bond," said Governor Chamberlain yesterday. "There are some of the bondsmen with whom I am not satisfied, and if the aggregate of the bonds supplied by them exceeds \$35,in the required amount of the bond that has been filed, I will call on Mr. Steel to provide for the deficiency until the state is protected by a bond that may be considered entirely good and in the aggregate amounting to not less than

"When I have had time to complete checking over the list of the 92 bondsmen, I shall notify the principal of such individuals with whom I am not satisfied, without publicly announcing their names, and ask that the difference between the total of the approved sureties and the amount of the bond I have required, \$600,000, been done, I shall approve the bond. check over the various individual bonds and pass on the financial standing and rating of the different bonds-
