FARMERS' TRAIN FOR UMATILLA

O. R. & N. MAY RUN SPECIAL TO THIS POINT

Considering Agitation Started by Farmers of Walla Walla and Touchet Districts for Similar Experimental Train to That Recently Run Through the Palouse Section—Umatilla Farmers May Request O. R. & N. Experts to Help.

So satisfactory was the farmers' train run through the Palouse district by the O. R. & N. company, that farmers of the Walla Walla and Touchet districts have now started an agitation for the same kind of a train and it is possible that it may be run into Umatilla county if farmers this side of the line join in the request.

The matter is now being discussed by the farming experts of Washington state agricultural college at Pullman and General Freight Agent R. B. Miller of the O. R. & N. and it is thought there is no doubt about the arrangements being made.

It is possible that Umatilla county farmers will request farming experts from Oregon Agricultural college to join in the movement and have the train run into Umatilla and possibly Morrow county for a course of lectures on dry farming, and summer fallow and deep plowing.

The farmer's train recently run over the O. R. & N. lines in the Palouse district was well patronized, over 3,000 people listening to the lectures and witnessing the demonstrations.

TO BUILD BUDDHIST TEMPLE.

Seattle to Have Only Building of Kind in the United States—To Cost \$18,000.

Within the next fortnight work will be begun on what will be the only Buddhist church in the United States owned by a Buddhist organization, the building standing on ground also owned by the society. The ground has been purchased at a cost of approximately \$6000 and the plans have been drawn for a \$12,000 edifice, says a Seattle dispatch.

G. Nakai, the pastor of the Seattle Japanese society, is now in Japan, and when he returns he will bring with him an image of Buddha, for which a place has been reserved in the chapel, and which will be set up and used in the services of the society.

The plans for the temple include a gymnasium, shower baths, a kitchen, dining room, library and 27 living rooms. A school for young men will be conducted in the building, where the students will be given a general education.

Practically all of the adherents of this Buddhist society are Japanese, but it also includes those of other nationalities who are devotees of Buddha, the president of the society being a woman of Scandinavian extraction, Selma Anderson.

SPEEDOMETER FOR TRAINS.

Passengers in New Dining Cars Have Only to Look at Device to Know Speed Rate.

"The latest things to be added to our Oriental Limited passenger trains are handsome new dining cars carrying speedometers," said W. A. Ross, assistant general passenger agent of the Great Northern, who is in the city today, says the Spokane Chronicle.

"These devices tell at what speed the train travels over every mile of track and registers accurately the length of stops. They are an exact check on the actions of a train crew."

"Our Oriental Limited trains, No. 1, west bound, and No. 2, eastbound, are now carrying almost entirely new equipment of the latest designs, added gradually during the last few months and are positively the finest trains running across the western states. The equipment formerly on the Oriental trains has been put on Nos. 3 and 4, thus advancing materially the standard of those trains."

Dr. Lutenberger to Portland.

Dr. J. G. M. Lutenberger, who recently came here from St. Louis to practice his profession, left last night for Portland to meet the state medical board in regard to securing a license to practice in the state. He has been practicing upon a temporary permit, only, and will now take an examination before the board. It is possible that he may go to St. Louis to look after property interests before returning to the city.

Indians Coming for Meeting.

At the meeting of the Tutuilla Indian church tomorrow a date will be fixed for a revival on the Umatilla reservation, at which it is expected that at least 10 Nez Perce Indian ministers will be present and at which at least 50 Indians of the Nez Perce reservation will attend.

Rowe Divorce Suit.

Suit for divorce was started yesterday by Rose Rowe against Charles E. Rowe, the complaint being filed by Judge James A. Fee. The two people were married at Sacramento on January 14, 1901, and in her complaint the plaintiff alleges that her husband gambled, drank to excess, remained away from home at nights, failed to support her and otherwise neglected to fulfill his marriage vows.

TAX PAYMENTS PANIC PANACEA

COUNTY TREASURY RECEIPTS INDICATE PROSPERITY.

Taxpayers of Umatilla Dump \$266,000 Into County Treasury in Time to Take Advantage of Three Per Cent Discount—County Warrants Will Be Taken Up—Practically No Debt—Only \$100,000 Outstanding in Warrants Which Represents County's Indebtedness.

That the people of Umatilla county are not greatly hampered for money in spite of last fall's financial flurry, is shown by the heavy tax payments that were made during the three per cent rebate period.

At the sheriff's office the deputies have now completed posting all the payments made and according to Deputy A. C. Funk, a total of \$266,000 was paid in during the rebate period. The total tax for the year is \$350,000.

Last year only a total of \$229,000 was paid in during the rebate period, while the total tax for the year was \$288,000.

Many tax payments are now being received at the sheriff's office by those who take advantage of the half payment offer. Under this plan a taxpayer may pay half his taxes now and half by October 1 without being subject to either penalty or interest. Many large concerns take advantage of this provision and thereby secure the use of half their tax money until fall.

As fast as the money is received at the sheriff's office it is turned over to the treasurer and as a result of the heavy payments made Treasurer Bradley will soon be able to call many outstanding warrants.

According to Mr. Bradley, he will shortly call for all general fund warrants registered prior to January 1, 1907, and for all road warrants now outstanding. He is now engaged in paying off \$20,000 in road warrants.

During the spring several calls for general fund warrants will be made, and according to the treasurer, he will be able to take up all warrants outstanding longer than 10 months.

County Is Prosperous.

That the county now has but about \$100,000 in outstanding warrants was declared this morning by Treasurer Bradley and he holds that such an indebtedness is trifling compared with the business and wealth of the county. He says the outstanding warrants merely represent the current debt of the county and properly speaking the county cannot be considered as in debt.

Narrow Escape for Steel.

A. B. Steel, agent for the Pacific Express company in this city, had a narrow escape from death this forenoon when a shotgun loaded with heavy buckshot was accidentally discharged in the back room at the express office. The charge of shot passed through the wall and scattered on entering the front office where Mr. Steel was seated at a desk and one shot struck him in the back, bruising him and raising a bump but not breaking the skin. The other shot lodged in the walls of the office. The thick intervening wall is all that prevented the death of the agent, perhaps, as the shot was discharged in line with his body. The gun belonged to the express messenger and it was not known that it was loaded.

Indians Return From Revival.

A party of 12 Umatilla Indians returned this morning from Spalding, Idaho, where they attended a revival among the Nez Perces. Over 2000 Indians were present at different times during the revival and eight native ministers were engaged in the services. A large number of Indians were converted. Many Flatheads from Montana were at the revival as well as Umatillas and Yakimas.

Came to Town in New Auto.

Henry J. Taylor and family came in from their farm nine miles north of the city for the first time in their new Franklin touring car today. The car is a 28-horse power machine and was ordered especially for Mr. Taylor by the Pendleton Auto company.

Bought Reiman Farm.

POWER COMPARED TO LONDON'S

Spokane Falls Developed Electricity Energy Equal to One-Third That of World's Metropolis.

The electricity generated by the power plants in Spokane during 1907 was more than one-third as much as that used in London in the same year, according to figures shown by D. L. Huntington, vice president and general manager of the Washington Water Power company, says the Spokesman-Review.

"The figures on the output of the kilowatt hours in London were brought to my notice by a man who got them from statistical reports," said Mr. Huntington. "This total output in 1907 in the metropolitan police area of London for power, heating and lighting was 213,174,279 kilowatt hours. The output of municipal plants was 87,995,001 kilowatt hours and of private companies, 125,379,278. The combined output of the Washington Water Power company's plants at Spokane and at Post Falls was 79,456,306 kilowatt hours. I think it is probable that figures shown for London do not include the electricity used for the operation of streetcars. They are significant, however, as showing the extent to which electricity is used in Spokane and vicinity as compared with a center about 25 times as populous."

QUEER TRICK OF AN INDIAN.

Lives Happily With Wife, But Wills Property to Another Woman.
