EDITOR TAKES LONG WALK.

New Proprietor of Laidlaw Chronicle Walks From Portland to Take Charge of Paper.

Among the passengers who arrived last night on the steamship Senator, 80 hours out from San Francisco, was John A. Seabury, late of the San Francisco Call, who has just bought a small weekly newspaper in Crook county, the Laidlaw Chronicle, says the Oregonian.

Laidlaw is a new stockraising town on the eastern slope of the mountains, 36 miles southwest of Prineville, the county seat, and 266 from Portland by the nearest route. It is also 90 miles from the nearest railroad station, Shaniko.

An ardent pedestrian of the western type, Seabury has hit upon a unique plan to draw attention and new subscribers to his little journal, until now published by W. P. Myers, a lawyer of the lava-bed district. Weather permitting Seabury will leave Portland this morning in an attempt to travel the 226 miles to Laidlaw about in 10 days. He is due at The Dalles the night of April 4, at Biggs April 5, at Shaniko April 8 and at Laidlaw April 11.

A FOOL JOKE

Employees of a Walla Walla Factory Think They Are Laid Off.

When employees of the Gilbert Hunt company reached the shops in West Main street this morning, they found posted on the doors the following notice: "Owing to the stringency in the money market all operations in this plant are suspended until further notice," says the Walla Walla Statesman.

Consternation reigned among the employees over the notice and the men stood around in excited groups discussing the shut down. Several took the situation philosophically and returned to their homes, while others waited around to interview the office force. Men in the office were equally ignorant of the cause of the shut-down and they joined in the general discussion.

It finally dawned on some of the employees that the notice was an "April Fool" joke and a merry ha-ha went up from several of the employees who were "next" and it is surmised had a hand in posting the notices.

The shops opened shortly after the usual hour. Some of the employees who had returned home were sent for and peace reigned once more in the big shops. The joke created a good deal of merriment among the employees, although it did not appear so funny to many of the force until it was fully established that the notices were posted in fun.

PRAISE FOR H. M. CAKE.

Republican Candidate for Senator Is Extremely Popular.

The People's Press of Portland says of H. M. Cake, republican candidate for the United States senate:

The senatorial fight has simmered down to a cinch. When U'Ren withdrew and appealed to the voters of the state to stand by statement No. 1, he settled the question. And when Mr. Cake in his first public speech, outlined a platform in entire accord with the underlying theory of statement No. 1 and of the direct primary and people's legislative system, Mr. Cake added additional certainty to the result of the coming election.

There is only one faction in Oregon that will prevent the election of a statement No. 1 candidate to the United States senate, that faction is the machine element in the republican party that is trying to cram down

the voters' throats a candidate that can be handled, with the result that a small chunk will be split off the republican party and this much strength added to the democratic column.

"But there is enough margin between the majority and the minority parties in Oregon to lop off the crooked, rotten branches from the party trunk and still give the statement No. 1 candidate the best of it."

A statement No. 1 candidate is going to be chosen, that's certain, and the republican voters in Oregon are going to prove that they have as high regard for their party affiliation and as deep a love for the right to let the people choose their candidates as have the democrats.

That also is certain, and to the man who can get away from the idea that being a good fellow means being a good public servant and who can see a higher principle in this fight for statement No. 1 than mere sweetened sound there can be but little doubt that not only will the machine in the republican party be smashed to very small atoms, but the republican party, the real, loyal, broad-minded, honest republican voters en masse, will see to it that a statement No. 1 legislative chooses a statement No. 1 senator from the party constituency.

TO FIGHT WEED PESTS.

Yakima Farmers Organize Against Pests.

With the advent of spring comes the ever present noxious weed. Farmers of North Yakima have long been troubled with all sorts of weeds, such as water grass, China lettuce and, above all, the Russian thistle, says the Yakima Herald. The latter has made its appearance during the last few years. It has, however, gained a stronger hold on crops than any of the other weeds. It is stated. Ranchers have made some individual efforts to eliminate the pest, but thus far have been unsuccessful.

It is known that the Russian thistle is not only one of the worst weeds to contend with once it gets started, but is also known to be disastrous to crops, and in some states the thistle has totally destroyed valuable growing grain and hay.

The thistle is not only found in the rural districts, but also along the city streets. It begins to grow early in the spring and keeps on until fall when the roots become rooted and the pest is blown for miles over valuable land, scattering its seed as it goes. This gives it the name of "tumble weed."

Farmers Fight Pest in a Body. Farmers in the Ritzville and Walla Walla countries have during the past years formed an organization each spring and fall to fight the pest, which threatens to totally put to flight their means of livelihood. Ranchers living around Ritzville have already started their spring crusade against the weed. Despite their efforts collectively the weed is fast gaining ground and is causing no small amount of anxiety.

The country around North Yakima is rapidly assuming the same appearance as the Ritzville and Walla Walla countries. Unless something is done, and that soon, the country threatens to be overrun.

New Turntable a Labor Saver.

Th air motor on the turntable is proving itself to be a wonderful saver of time. It has been installed long enough now to have been fully tested. One man is all that is required to turn the monster locomotives, where formerly it required six or seven and even that many were forced to get down to hard work. Time is saved in "spotting" engines. The hostler need not be as careful in getting his engine on the exact spot with the air motor arrangement as he did when hand power was used. The round house crew is highly pleased with the machine.—La Grande Observer.

Petition for Local Option Filed.

Today W. A. Worstell filed petitions from various precincts in the county asking the county court to order placed on the official ballot at the coming June election the proposition to vote the saloons out of the county as a whole, under the local option law. There were 632 names on the petition which were secured in three days.—La Grande Observer.
