HELD UP BY SUGAR TRUST.

Prices Advanced 60 Cents Per 100 in Spokane and Elsewhere.

On account of a combination of sugar interests at San Francisco recently, the price of sugar has been advanced 60 cents in this city, says the Chronicle. The prices have been increasing in the east for some time, but on account of a keen competition between Honolulu companies and California concerns the price on the Pacific coast has been kept down.

Now, however, comes the report of a colossal sugar combination at San Francisco, which has gained absolute control of the sugar supply.

"A war of extermination between the sugar barons of the coast was closed recently and the proverbial hatchet buried," asserts a coast report. "The first act was to announce an advance of 30 cents per hundredweight, and later in the week another advance of 10 cents was declared."

Local retail prices are now quoted at \$7.25 per cwt., cane sugar, and \$7.10 per cwt. beet sugar. Some of the retailers continue to give 14 pounds for a dollar, but it is stated that a raise is liable to be made.

THE "DRY" TERRITORY.

In Two Thirds of the United States Liquor Is Forbidden.

Ferdinand C. Ingelhard says of the "dry territory" in the United States, in April Review of Reviews:

In two thirds of all the territory of the United States the saloon has been abolished by law. Forty years ago there were 3,500,000 people living in territory where the sale of liquor was prohibited. Now there are 36,000,000 people under prohibitory law. Since that time the population of the country has scarcely doubled, while the population in prohibition territory has increased tenfold.

There are 20,000,000 people in the 14 southern states, 17,000,000 of whom are under prohibitory law in some form. In 1900 there were 18,000,000 under prohibition in the United States; now there are 36,000,000. In eight months state-wide prohibition has cleared the saloon from an area as great as that of France.

In that area there is a solid block of territory 300 miles north and south by 750 miles east and west, in which on the first day of next January a bird can fly from the Mississippi to the Atlantic ocean, and from the boundary of Tennessee to the Gulf of Mexico, without looking down upon a legalized saloon. Great Britain and Ireland could be set down over this space without covering it. There would be 10,000 square miles of "dry" territory left as a border.

FIRST-BORN OF PUYALLUP.

Yakima Man Claims Distinction of Being "First White Child," Etc.

J. H. Boatman of North Yakima, the first white child born in the Puyallup valley, is now at Puyallup participating in a celebration there in anniversary of the start made 56 years ago by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Willis Boatman, from Auburn, Ill., by ox team and prairie schooner for Oregon and Washington, says the Yakima Republic.

All the children living, with their families, were present. Mr. Boatman settled on his present farm January 11, 1854, and the present North Yakima rancher, John Boatman, was born there on July 28 of that year. The old cabin, which was the original homestead, is still in existence. Not a nail was used in its construction. About it centered the festivities on Sunday, which was the anniversary day.

Mr. Boatman, the elder, relates for newspaper publication how he declined to purchase for a plug of tobacco a homestead relinquishment at Sumner. He says that in those days he thought the tobacco had the greater value. The pioneer's tale of the hardships of the trip across the continent, including decimation of the original party from cholera, Indian troubles, mountain fever, etc., is a thrilling one. Mrs. John Boatman of North Yakima was the only one of the immediate relatives who was not present at the reunion and celebration.
