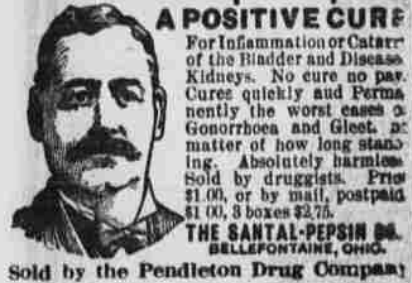

Finishing O. R. & N. Bridge.

The five cars comprising the train that accommodates the paint crew of the O. R. & N. have reached North Lewiston and in a short time the work of painting the Clearwater railroad bridge will be commenced, says the Lewiston Tribune. The cars accommodate a crew of 30 painters. Four of the cars are used for lodging, dining room and kitchen facilities and the fifth for supplies. It had been planned to begin the work of painting the bridge immediately upon the arrival of the cars, but later it was decided to wait until the riveting of the structure is further advanced. The crew will be brought here in a few days. The train is the one kept in regular service by the O. R. & N. and came here direct from Portland.

The work on the last span of the bridge on the south side of the river is now receiving the attention of the bridge construction crew and the steel will reach the abutment pier during the week. The work of installing the braces that will extend along the top of the bridge will then receive attention. The riveting work, which was started on the north side, has now reached a point this side of the draw span and main channel.

There now seems no possibility of a doubt that the bridge will be entirely completed and ready for the operation of trains by the latter part of this month, thus enabling the service into Lewiston to be inaugurated as planned, May 1, when the Portland excursionists will visit here.

Fine progress is being made in the work of completing the new road. Six hundred men are now employed and all details of construction are being rushed.

Hood River to Imitate Pendleton.

Lewiston Names Cleanup Day.

The city had agreed to employ teams to carry off the rubbish, subject to city control as to the teams to be employed. Next Friday was the time designated for cleaning up and the following morning was designated as the particular period when the teams should assemble to carry off the debris.

The committee named by the club immediately designated districts and appointed the superintendents of the same.

Trying to Corner Meat in Spokane.

That the wholesale butchers are trying to get a corner on the local meat market and run out the smaller independent butchers, is the confession of one of the wholesale merchants of this city, says the Spokane Chronicle.

While he would not allow his name to be used, he said that he had been selling goods to the meat consumers of Spokane at less than cost for the last six weeks and gave as one of the reasons the fact that the wholesalers were endeavoring to put the smaller independent butchers out of business.

Stuck to His German.

Christian Ziegenhagen, who died in The Dalles recently, was 92 years old at the time of his death, had lived in the United States 41 years and had never learned the English language. When he first came to this country he settled in a German community in the east, and upon his arrival in The Dalles 11 years ago, found that he could not acquire English. He is survived by 20 grandchildren, 20 great-grandchildren and one great-grandchild.—Hood River News-Letter.

IDAHO SHEEP ARE FREE FROM SCAB

STATE BOARD REPORTS

GOOD CONDITIONS

During Past Year 116 Glandered Horses Were Killed—State Allowed \$2622 for Stock Killed on Account of Disease—Bounty Law Is Satisfactory.

The Boise Capital News says of the condition of livestock in the state of Idaho:

Communications from various parts of the state and from other states which were presented at the livestock and sanitary board at its annual meeting which convened yesterday and was still in progress today in the office of the state veterinarian, show that the sheep of Idaho are more free from scab and in better condition than those of any state in the west, foot rot and scabbies having been practically eradicated.

For the fiscal year ending March 6, the state veterinarian reported that there had been 116 glandered horses destroyed. While in this year more glandered horses were destroyed than in either of the preceding years in which the law has been in effect, it does not show that the disease is on the increase, the state veterinarian having had more time during the past year in which to look up the source and any reported cases of infection.

The board decided at the meeting last evening to vigorously enforce the law relative to the removal of stock and cattle from the state. J. W. Weber of Rexburg, one of the members of the board, said this morning that this law has not been strictly enforced and in many instances stolen stock or cattle have been taken from the state, through the failure on the part of the cattlemen and constables to observe the law which requires that the constable be notified where cattle are to be taken from the state in order that he may inspect them and see that they have not been stolen.

The board adjourned this afternoon after allowing \$2622 for animals killed under the predatory animal act. The system adopted by the board at its last meeting in December, that of paying a dollar a scalp for animals has proved very effective and is bringing much better results than the former plan of paying hunters so much a day for killing animals.

WOOL PRICES STRONG

Breeders' Gazette Gives Optimistic View of Situation

In strong contrast with the bearish predictions being made by arriving woolbuyers is a story that appeared in the last issue of the Breeders' Gazette, a publication regarded as a good authority upon market conditions. According to the article the market in the southwest this spring

has been much better than is represented by the buyers and good wool prices will prevail as soon as the market shapes itself.

The article in full is as follows: Sentiment in trade circles is that the market has passed through the worst. Growers are disposed to resist bear raids. Arizona's are reaching Boston on consignment with advances of 12c to 15c a pound for the best lots. A year ago these wools were selling at 20c to 21c and they are expected to move at 17c to 20c as soon as the market shapes itself. All the trade needs is a bracer. Among recent sales at Boston were 10,000 Ohio washed delaines at 38c; 15,000 quarter blood clothing fleeces at 23 1/2c and 30,000 black fleeces at 21c. Included in the sales of quarters were 15,000 Ohio, 22,000 Michigan, 10,000 Michigan and 25,000 quarters in different gradings, all at prices ranging from 28c down to 25c.
