PRICES TOO LOW FOR CHANGE NOW

SHEEPMEN DO NOT WANT ALLOTMENT REDUCED.

Protest Against Proposed Reduction in Number of Sheep to Be Allotted to Forest Reserve—Declare "Off" Market Would Mean Great Financial Loss if They Are Compelled to Sell at This Time.

Oregon sheepmen are now out with a protest against any reduction in the number of sheep to be allotted on the forest reserves in this state this year and they hope that their argument on the subject will prevail with the government.

According to the sheepmen, they feel that the present condition of the sheep market should deter the forestry people from making any reductions this year. While they hold that sheep should now be worth as much or more than in the past, the financial condition of the country has tended to put the market "off" for a time. Consequently they do not want to be forced to sell now, at a sacrifice.

Under the plans of the forestry bureau a cut of from 10 to 30 per cent is to be made in the number of sheep allowed on the Oregon ranges the coming summer. Should this plan be carried out many sheepmen will have good reason for objecting to a

cut, though they say that if market conditions were normal they would have no serious objection to a reduction.

The protest against the reduction is to be made by the executive committee of the Oregon Woolgrowers' association and President J. N. Burgess has called a meeting of the committee for April 10. Those on the committee are President Burgess, George Currin, vice president, Dan P. Smythe, secretary, H. C. Rooper of Antelope, William Slusher, Pendleton, George Perry, Lone Rock, William Rette, Fossil, J. C. Moore, Mt. Vernon, and J. G. Hoke, Medical Springs.

BIG MINING COMPANY FORMED.

Pendleton Men File \$3,000,000 Papers in Walla Walla.

The Walla Walla Statesman says of the filing in that city of incorporation papers of a mining company composed principally of Pendleton men:

With a capital stock of \$3,000,000, the King Solomon Gold Mining company is about to open up in this city for business. Articles of incorporation were filed this morning and in them Walla Walla is designated as being the principal place of business of the mining company which is to carry its activities into the three states of the northwest.

Frank H. Shoemaker and George D. Peebler of Pendleton filed the papers this morning. In the instrument as placed on record, the name of the company will be the King Solomon Gold Mining company, which is to do a general mining business in the states of Washington, Idaho and Oregon. The business of the company will be to prospect, discover and locate mining claims of gold, silver, copper or any other ore.

They will also buy, own and maintain and operate mills and reducing plants. Further the company intends to maintain and operate trails, roads, tramways, telegraphs and telephones, as may be needed to carry on business.

The capital stock will be divided into 3,000,000 shares of \$1 each. The life of the company is to be 50 years. Walla Walla is to be the principal place of business.

The trustees for three months or until the first election by the stockholders, are named thus: C. O. White of Seattle; Fred H. Shoemaker, John W. Crowe and George D. Peebler of Pendleton, and E. B. Shafter of Pilot Rock.

SUES SLUSHER FOR DAMAGES.

J. A. Hawks Wants Pay for Horse Killed in Runaway During Fight.

As an aftermath of the fight that occurred at Nollin recently between J. A. Hawks and A. W. Slusher, a suit for \$215 damages has been brought against Slusher by Hawks.

The complaint in the case was filed early this morning and in the same Hawks alleges that on March 6 "the defendant did wrongfully and unlawfully beat and strike the plaintiff on the head and face, thereby causing the plaintiff to fall to the ground." He further declares that at the time he, Hawks, was holding his horse, which was hitched to a buggy and that the animal became frightened and ran away. The horse ran over a bluff and was killed, while the buggy was demolished. He sues for \$150 damages for the horse; \$50 for the buggy and \$15 for the harness. The complaint for Hawks was filed by Attorneys Lowell & Winter.
