HORSE TUMBLED INTO CREEK.

Excitement about Livery Barn When Animal's Predicament is Discovered.

Straying from his stall in the Pioneer barn, a sober-minded member of the equine race, this afternoon fell into the turbulent waters of the classic Mill creek and for a time there was some excitement over his rescue. The horse seemed not to care greatly whether he was rescued or not and but for the fact that there was nothing in sight to eat, would probably have been contented to stay, says the Walla Walla Statesman.

But the proprietors of the barn, were more worried. They wanted the horse out and they wanted him out badly. But how, was the question. The creek is bulkheaded along that part, which was just above the Die Brucke building and the animal did not seem to care to breast the waters and go up stream to where bulkheads are an unknown quantity. He was satisfied and he didn't care who knew it. Donning thigh boots, one of the employees of the stable went in after the pony. But the horse wouldn't lead. He preferred the water.

Despair was beginning to settle over the little band of rescuers when a man who had some experience with horses, came along, grasped the halter rope firmly with his right hand, said "Come up here!"—and some other words. And the horse jumped over the bulkhead with an expression of "April Fool" two days delayed, which shamed the spectators beyond words.

Calcutta Jute Mill Curtailment.
Consul-General William H. Michael advises that it has been unanimously agreed among the owners and agents of the Calcutta jute mills to curtail the output of gunnies, by not working on this class of production on Saturday of each week beginning on March 1, 1906. This action is taken on account of the distress in the gunny trade. He adds that the 24 jute mills around Calcutta at the close of 1905 held \$16,190,744 worth of jute in stock as compared with \$18,968,992 in 1904 and \$11,321,829 in 1905.
