PENALTY WILL BE ADDED.

Monday the Last Day to Pay Taxes Without the Addition of Interest Charges.

Monday will be the last day of the period during which half payments of taxes may be made at the sheriff's office. After that date those who have not paid their taxes in full or half will become subject to the penalty of 10 per cent and in addition interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum will be charged.

The half payment period lasts from March 15 to the first Monday in April. During that time some taxpayers have paid half their taxes and will wait until October to pay the remainder. By this course they have the use of their money until fall and are not subject to the penalty. However, many of those paying taxes during the past two weeks have paid the amounts in full, according to the men in the sheriff's office. For the most part these are people with small tax payments and they pay the entire amount now so as to save the trouble of making another payment in the fall.

FINALLY GOT HER WISH.

American Girl Wanted to Read Historical Volume and Succeeds.

Miss Ida Clough of Boston, a graduate of Bryn Mawr, who is studying in Berlin for a doctor's degree, wished to use a Greek volume of the year 1255, which is in the National library at Paris, says a cable from Berlin.

The directors of the National library wrote a note to this effect to the German ministry of education. The ministry wrote to the foreign office, and the latter wrote to the imperial chancellor. The imperial chancellor sent the request to the French ambassador to Germany, and then it was up to France.

The French ambassador at Berlin wrote to the German ambassador at Paris, who wrote to the French foreign office, and so on, following the circumlocution at Berlin, till the request finally reached the director of the Paris National library.

At the end of five months Miss Clough is now able to read the precious volume in the presence of one of the custodians of the Berlin library.

AGED RANCHER SUICIDES.

Body Found Several Days After Deed—Horse Also Found in Pitiable Condition.

John M. Stewart, an aged rancher who had a homestead in the old river bed 10 miles west of Prineville, committed suicide while alone at his cabin, and the badly decomposed body was found by Deputy Sheriff Ben Jones on Wednesday of last week, says the Madras Pioneer.

An empty bottle bearing a laudanum label was found on a stand near the bed. From the condition of the body it was apparent that Stewart had been dead for a week or 10 days. A horse was found tied in a stable near the house in a most pitiable condition for want of food and water.
